POULTRY RAISING. [From the Fredericton Gleaner, Feb'y 24.] With the view of awakening a greater interest in the profitable industry of poultry raising, the provincial government engaged the services of Dr. Twitchell, of Portland, Me., as associate editor of the Maine Farmer, to lecture on this topic in some of the leading agricultural centres of the province.

HOW TO BUY A HORSE. An old horseman says: If you want to buy a horse, don't believe your own eyes. Take no man's word for it. Your eye is your market. Don't buy a horse in harness. Unhitched him and take everything off out his harness, and lead him around. If he has a corn or is stiff, or has any other failing, you can see it. Let him go by himself a ways, and if he staves right in any way, you know that he is blind. Back him, too. Some he show their weakness or tricks in that way when they don't in any other. But, be as smart as you can, you'll get caught sometimes. Even an expert was such a horse. He took every notice and got a great price, and yet he was blind. There isn't a man could tell it until something happens. Or he may have a weak back. He may have the wind and off he goes for a mile or two, then all of a sudden he stops in the road. After a rest he starts again but he soon stops for good, and nothing but a derrick can move him.

THE weak points of a horse can be better discovered while standing than by moving. If he is sound his will stand firmly and squarely on his legs without moving them. Lay a yard upon the ground, with legs plump and naturally poised; or if the foot is lifted from the ground and the weight taken from it, disease may be suspected, or at least tenderness, which is a precursor of disease. If the horse stands with his feet spread apart, or straddles with his hind legs, there is a weakness in the loins, and the kidneys are disordered. Heavy pulling bends the knees. Bitch, milky cast eyes in horses indicate upon blindness or some blinding eye. A tail-tipped one keeps his ears thrown back; a kicking horse is apt to have scurred legs; a stumbling horse has blemished knees. When the skin is rough and harsh, and does not move easily to the touch the horse is a heavy eater, and digestion is bad. Never buy a horse whose breathing organs are all impaired. Place your ear at the heart, and if a wheezing sound is heard it is an indication of trouble.
