**CONVICTIONS.**  
On the 15th November, Michael Campion was convicted before Robert Hutchinson, Thomas Pethick and Donald Melsaac, Esqrs., J. of Her Majesty's Justices of Peace for Queen's County, of an assault on Jonathan Mancham, and fined 70s. with 28s. costs, or to be imprisoned two months.
