Result—lawyers, 18; outsiders, 4. The feature of the day was a phenomenal catch on second base by Surozate Clerk McDonald. Batteries—Holmes and P. Malcolmson, Chilton and S. Malcolmson.

In the first week in July, weekly payments for all working people will become compulsory by law in the State of New York. The curious feature in the passage of this act was that for three months the opponents of it tried to prevent it coming to a vote, but when it did it was carried with only one dissenting voice. A similar law would be of great advantage to Canada. With the passage of such a law the credit system would be greatly narrowed, to the advantage of all.

ELECTING THE SCHOOL INSPECTOR FOR NORTH HURON.—The election of the School Inspector for North Huron, made vacant by the death of Mr Malloch, caused a ripple of excitement at the county council gathering during the week.

At first it was believed that Mr. Park, the efficient principal of Goderich Model School, would be the probable man, but on Tuesday a caucus of a certain section of the council was held, and it was determined to run Mr Bruce as the nominee of that wing. The result was that the election for the vacant position simmered down to a contest between Mr Robb, of Clinton, and Mr Bruce, of Toronto, formerly of Bluevale, Huron Co., which was finally decided in favor of the former by a vote of 25 to 23.

HURON COUNTY COUNCIL.

The Regular June Session—Minutes up to Date.
The council met pursuant to adjournment from last meeting, the warden in the chair. Members all present except D. D. Wilson, Seaforth.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Letters from the Deputy-Minister of Education and Mrs Malloch were read and ordered to be filed.

Application of Mr Tom to have East Wawanosh added to his inspectorate was read and referred to the school committee.

Position of the trustees of S. S. No. 11, Hay, against the decision of the township council of Hay, refusing to enlarge the boundaries of the section, was read and referred to the school committee.

Application of Mr Wray and others of S. S. No. 1, Hay and Stanley, to make alterations, was read and referred to the school committee.

Application of W. H. Harvey to be nominated as a county pupil to the Agricultural College was read and referred to the special committee.

The following report of the county auditors was read and referred to the finance committee:

REPORT OF COUNTY AUDITORS.
We, the undersigned, auditors for your county, respectfully beg leave to report that we have carefully examined the books and vouchers of your treasurer, and after comparing the various entries therein with the proper vouchers, we have much pleasure in reporting the same correct, showing a balance of cash on hand of \$1,269 68, which balance was found at the credit of your treasurer at the Canadian Bank of Commerce, Goderich. We have also audited the Public and High School accounts, and find them correct, and report that we have carefully examined the statement showing the balance in the hands of the township treasurers on the 1st of March, 1890. TREASURER'S STATEMENT.
GENTLEMEN:—I submit herewith the usual statement of collections from non-resident lands for the portion of the year ending April 30th, and of cash on hand and available to meet current expenditures. I have to report that since the first of the year I have loaned on first mortgages at 6 per cent \$15,250 00. Of this amount nearly \$8,000 was taken from funds for current expenditure, the sinking fund account being exhausted. This money was lying in the bank at 3 per cent, and will in all probability be restored before needed. Moved by Mr McLean, seconded by Mr Ratz, that Mr Manning be appointed a substitute to fill Mr D. D. Wilson's place on the school and printing committee. Carried.

Moved by Mr Manning, seconded by Mr Dulmage, that deputy-reeve Henderson be placed upon the equalization committee to act in the place of D. D. Wilson during the latter's absence. Carried.

The report of Mr Anley, road commissioner, was read as follows, and referred to the road and bridge committee:—

REPORT OF ROAD COMMISSIONER.
GENTLEMEN:—I beg to submit to you this, my second report for the year 1890. All the improvements which you ordered to be made at your January meeting have been placed under contract and will be completed at an early date. The south extension to the Clinton river bridge was awarded to L. Hardy, of Exeter, for \$350; the stonework at the Clinton bridge was awarded to F. Guttridge, Seaforth, at \$9 50 per cubic yard. The contracts for Grey's bridge on the Nile road and Buckley's on the L.S.R. in Ashfield were given to Robt. Jameson, Howick, at \$74 each. The contract to erect the verandah at the cottage on the jail yard was let to John Walker, and completed for \$25. The contract to erect the drawer racks in the vault at the registry office was let to D. K. Strachan, Goderich, at 28 cents each drawer. The contract for the county of Perth has not taken any action with regard to the erecting of the bridge on the county boundary, between Grey and Elms, consequently there has not been anything done in the matter. I have issued the following orders since January 1st to June 17th, 1890:—Daniel McPain, repairing approaches to 18-Mile river bridge, L. S. R. Ashfield, \$8; John Mele, cleaning jam from Manchester bridge and filling washout, \$9 50; Wm. Lasham, repairing floor and approaches to Millan bridge, \$7 65; Robert Menzies, repairing two bridges, boundary between Grey and Elms, Co. of Huron's half, \$5; Joseph Allenson, for balance on account of repairing approach to Clinton bridge, \$6; John McClennan, rebuilding bridge, \$30; Thos. Veal, repairing Elmville bridge, 75 cts; Richard Bailey, repairing Bayfield and Hall's bridges, \$2 25; John Glenn, repairing bridge on gravel road north of Dunganon, \$1 50; Rich. Tichborne, spikes used in Mattland bridge, \$1 50; W. B. Foster, repairing bridge and spikes for same, \$8 60; Amant Brox, 2000 feet bridge flooring, delivered at Brussels bridge, \$15; A. G. Brown, laying floors of Wroxeter and Day's bridges, \$14 75; F. & G. Gibson, 11,000 feet bridge flooring, \$104 50; W. L. Henry, 210 lbs. spikes, Warrant and Day bridge floors, \$6 50; John Walker, erecting verandah at gaol cottage, \$25. There should be a considerable number of repairs made to bridges and approaches this summer, and some of the bridges that are two or three years old will require to be tightened and it would be advisable to cover with pitch or tar the parts liable to hold water. In many places I have noticed that the railing and guards of bridges and approaches are being wilfully defaced or injured, and the notices defaced or taken away. I think it would have a good effect if the county would offer a reward for the conviction of parties who thus injure the county property. I would also recommend that a suitable porch be erected at the entrance to the registry office. The amount of money likely to be required for the year 1890 for bridges, approaches and repairs to the county buildings, including \$150 for removing the jam from the river at Wingham will not exceed \$10,000. The following report of Jailer Dickson was read and referred to the jail and court house committee:—

REPORT OF GAOLER.
GENTLEMEN:—Herewith I submit for your consideration my report of your county gaol. There are at present confined in the gaol seven prisoners, six males and one female. The latter, Mary Brady, has been repeatedly reported to you. She is from McKillop township, and was committed from there as a vagrant and has been re-committed for the eighth time by Mayor Butler, of Goderich. She is weak-minded, has no friends as far as we know, and is a fit subject for a house of refuge. Of the males two are vagrants, one Wm. McInnis, committed by Mayor Butler for sixty days, the other Charles Andrews, committed by Wm. Lewis and Charles Brown, of the township of Stephen, for thirty days. The other three are insane, were all made by prison labor, but the women's dresses and underclothing and the shirts and pillow-slips I had to get made otherwise. A bill for the making of these will be presented to you, duly certified. The locks ordered by you have also been got, and the porch on the south side of the gaoler's quarters has been put up as per contract. All of which is respectfully submitted.

GENTLEMEN:—Since my report of June 3rd to you I have further to state that three more prisoners have been received into the gaol—all males. Two of these are awaiting trial for larceny, the third, John Morrow, committed as a vagrant for the fourteenth time by Mayor Butler, of Goderich, is sixty-eight years of age and quite infirm. His term is thirty days. Yesterday I purchased two barrels of fresh shell lime for sanitary purposes, a bill for which will be presented to you duly certified.

A number of accounts were referred to the finance committee.

A communication from the secretary of Clinton Collegiate Institute, intimating that there was a vacancy on the board caused by the resignation of Mr Pay, was read and referred to the school committee.

Council then adjourned till Wednesday at ten a.m.

SECOND DAY—WEDNESDAY.
The council met pursuant to adjournment, the warden in the chair. All the councillors present, except Messrs. D. D. Wilson and P. Kelly.

The minutes of the previous day were read and approved.

The application of Mr. Morgan for the Inspectorship of North Huron was referred to the school committee.

The first report of the school committee was read and adopted.

SCHOOL AND PRINTING COMMITTEE.
We have examined the certificates of each of the applicants for the position of Inspector of Public Schools for East Huron and summarize the qualification of each as follows:—R. Park—1st class certificate, Grade A, as a Public School teacher, 13 years' experience in Public and High Schools. R. W. Murray—1st class certificate, Grade A, as a Public School teacher, and certificate as a specialist in English; 14 years' experience in Public and High Schools. H. H. Burgess—1st class certificate, Grade A, as a Public School teacher; 12 years' experience as a Public School teacher. David Robb—1st class certificate, Grade A, as a Public School teacher; certificate as assistant master in High School or Collegiate Institute; specialist in natural history, botany and agricultural chemistry; 1st class certificate in drill, etc., of Military College, Kingston; 16 years' experience in Public Schools and 9 years' experience in High Schools. E. W. Bruce—1st class certificate, Grade A, as a Public School teacher; medalist of Collingwood Collegiate Institute (winner of Governor-General's medal for general proficiency); 10 years' experience as Public School teacher. J. B. Wilson—1st class certificate, grade A, as a Public School teacher; B.A. of Toronto University; certificate as master in High Schools and Collegiate Institutes; specialist in English; 19 years' experience in Public and High Schools and Collegiate Institutes. Jas W. Moran—1st class certificate, Grade A, as a Public School teacher; 19 years' experience as a Public and High School teacher. All the applicants except H. H. Burgess and J. W. Moran produce certificates from the Educational Department showing that they are fully qualified for the position of Inspector, and your committee from the evidence before them believe that the two named are also qualified though their certificates are not produced. We submit all the names to the full council, and recommend that the council ballot for a choice from amongst these applicants for

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
