At the City Hall.

The Municipal Council held its regular weekly meeting last evening. The Mayor presided and the full board attended.

Inspector General Hutchings wrote stating he would arrange for one of the police officers to do duty each night at Bannerman Park as set forth in Council's communication on the subject.

The Secretary St. John's Gas Co. in answer to Council's communication stated he would have the cut complained of properly graded.

R. M. Pidgeon on behalf of the Imperial Oil Company asked permission to repair a certain portion of the South Side road near their premises at their own expense and subject to supervision of the Council's Engineer. Request acceded to.

North American Scrap and Metal Co., requested to be allowed to erect on their premises, Clift's Cove, a metal pot to melt lead. Granted subject to Engineer's approval.

A. Bigham's application to make repairs to building corner Adelaide and New Gower Streets was granted subject to Engineer's direction.

Application of John Burke, 62 Lime Street, to erect scaffold to make repairs to roof was granted subject to Engineer's approval.

Councillor Mullaly drew attention to complaint of citizens about fish ofal being allowed to remain on the public wharf, Long Bridge. During the past few days the odour was an annoyance to people passing. Parties taking delivery of this ofal are to have same removed immediately it is landed.

Report of Medical Health Officer showed four new cases of diphtheria for week ending August 28th.

The reports of the City Engineer, Plumbing Inspector, etc. dealing with the various branches of the City service were also read.

After disposing of some routine business and passing pay rolls and bills, etc., the meeting adjourned.

The Ladies' Branch of the N. I. W. A. held its first regular meeting in the British Hall last evening. President Mrs. A. E. Barle in the chair. Speeches were delivered by Messrs. E. J. Whitty and W. The President reported having interviewed the manager of the Knitting Mills re matters affecting the employees there, and also reported being well received. She was also directed to interview the management at the Ropewalk in connection with the dismissal of some employees. Some private business was transacted and the meeting closed with the singing of the National Anthem, after which the organizing members were treated to refreshments provided by one of the gentlemen present.
