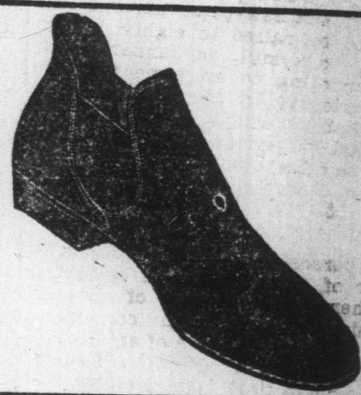

16 PER CENT. ADVANCE.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 19.
The price of newspaper paper in Can-
ada is to be raised to eighty dollars
per ton, f.o.b. mill, on January first,
according to an announcement
made yesterday by the Paper Con-
troller, Robert Pringle. The price now
being paid by Canadian newspapers is
sixty-nine dollars per ton.

FEELING RAN HIGH.

BOMBAY, Dec. 19.
Five persons were killed, and a
number of others wounded to-day at
Bombay, the capital of French
Indo-China, in connection
with a riot in the course of an election
to choose a French Deputy.
Police officers fired upon the crowd.

IN TROUBLE AGAIN.

BOSTON, Dec. 19.
The British steamer Manchester
bound for St. John, N.B., which was re-
ported in distress Wednesday, but
which sent a radio message saying
she had repaired her steering gear
and would proceed, was again out of
control last night.

SCHOONER TURNED TURTLE.

NORFOLK, Va., Dec. 19.
Two members of the crew and five
Chinese perished Wednesday when the
schooner "Sunbeam" turned
turtles at sea off the Virginia Capes.
The story of this disaster reached
Norfolk yesterday, when the Coast
Guard Cutter, Manning, landed seven
survivors of the ship, including Cap-
tain Eversen, four members of the
crew, two Chinese and the body of
another Chinaman.

HOOD GEORGE'S COALS OF FIRE.

LONDON, Dec. 19.
Continuing his speech in the Com-
mons yesterday in regard to the pre-
sent European situation, Premier
Lloyd George referred to the assist-
ance Allies were rendering Austria in
fuel, coal and other supplies, which
he described as a mere soup kitchen
policy to mitigate a situation requir-
ing large methods. He continued, "but
England alone already is severely
hardened and cannot undertake the
task of restoring a shattered world,
and I fail to see what can be done un-
less America comes frankly with us
to take up her share." Lloyd
George declared that without any
hesitation, and about wishing to de-
rive the United States or the honor
of sharing in the guardianship of
Christian communities the Allies had
decided to make peace with Turkey
at the earliest possible moment.

LABOR WANTS ELECTION.

LONDON, Dec. 19.

ROME, Dec. 19.
A definite settlement of the Fiume
question will be reached at the com-
ing conference of the Premiers and
Foreign Ministers of the Allied na-
tions, says the Giornale d'Italia.

MANXMAN FOUNDERED.

HALIFAX, N.S., Dec. 19.
Forty-three members of the crew of
the British steamer Manxman have
been drowned, according to a wire-
less message from the tanker British
Isles, intercepted at Campdown
Station this morning. The British
Isles, which is due at New York Mon-
day, says she has survivors aboard.

LATER.

HALIFAX, N.S., Dec. 19.
The captain, first mate, fourth en-
gineer, wireless operator and thirty-
nine of the crew of the British steam-
er Manxman were drowned, when
their ship foundered in mid-Atlantic
on Thursday morning, according to
a wireless message sent out by the
British steamer, British Isles, bound
for New York, intercepted here this
morning. The message said that all
other officers of the Manxman, chief
steward, and eleven of the crew are
safe on board the British Isles. The
radiogram did not state how the other
men lost their lives, but it is pre-
sumed that they went down with the
ship. The British Isles sighted the
distrained ship on Wednesday, and
stood by her for twenty-four hours,
according to a wireless message,
which added that the steamer sank in
latitude 41.53; long. 53.51.

A Significant Omission.

Commenting on the ill-feeling that
has existed ever since the war of 1870-
71 between the French and the Ger-
mans, Sir Edward Woodward, the
chief of the new Citizen Guard, told
the following story:

In connection with the Paris Ex-
hibition of 1900 (said Sir Edward)
there was a little railroad, five miles
in length, running round the
grounds. The track ran in and out the
trees and buildings, and so near them
that a passenger's head or arm thrust
out of a window was in danger of be-
ing knocked off.

To prevent accidents of this sort,
warnings were printed on large pos-
ters and tacked up at intervals of a
few yards along the entire track. They
were printed in almost every known
language, including Asiatic and Arri-
can tongues.

But there was one omission and a
very important one. Not a single word
of warning was printed in German!
Someone said to the manager of the
road:

"It looks as though you didn't care
whether the Germans got their heads
and arms knocked off or not."

He smiled a quiet smile and replied,
"It does look that way, sure enough."

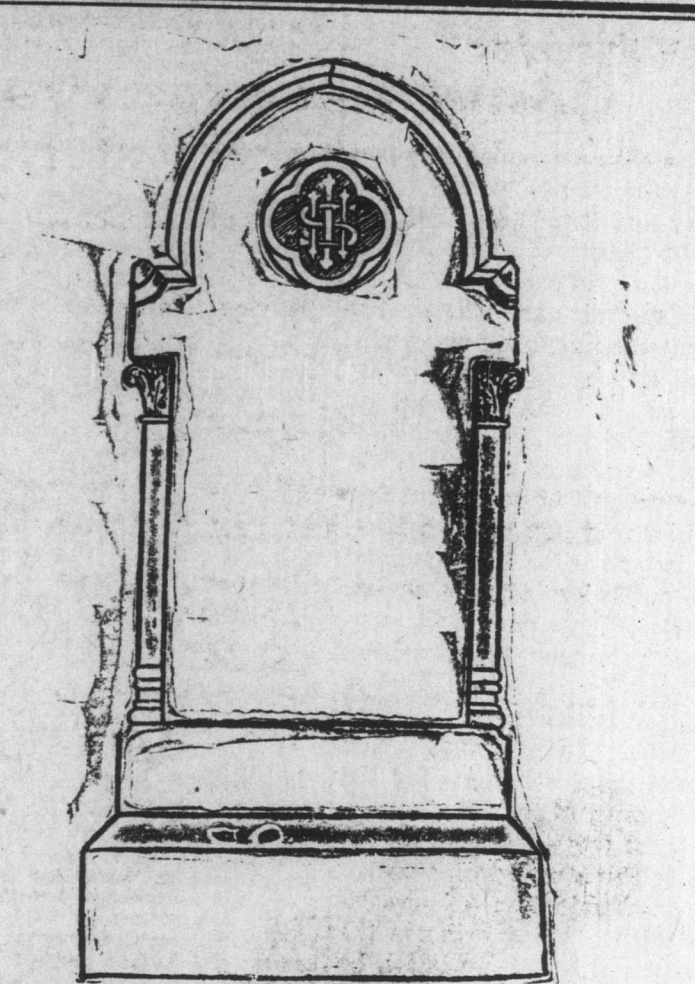
