Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.)

Newfoundland Fish is now down to 65 - in some of the markets of the Mediterranean, and there are likely to be heavy losses on cargoes in these markets aggregating two and a hali million dollars on the fish that is already gone forward. By the time all the catch of 1919 is gone out, it will no doubt, be much greater. The prospect for the coming fishery does not look very bright and the merchants who are accustomed to give out supplies intend to curtail to a considerable extent. The prospect of prices is now evident and the full and keen competition that is now in the field against Newfoundland fish by all the fishing countries will preclude the \$1.60 per gallon. likelihood of our fish being over \$10. If it holds at \$9.00 and \$10.00 we shall be fortunate as it will be possible to carry on the venture at these prices. But should the price go lower it will not pay to undertake the fishery at the high prices for outfit now prevail-

CODFISH.-Markets very dull at home and abroad. The export from St. John's this week amounted to 17,-144 quintals, and from the outports (St. Lawrence, Fortune, and Marystown) 14,486, making a total of 31,630 quintals. This is a good weekly average. Of this total 11.354 quintals were sent to Brazil, 7.146 to Halifax, 3.456 to Oporto 9.674 to Gibraltar. The total left in Newfoundland is now down to about 250,000 quintals of which Brazil will take a large proportion, and at present rate of shipment all will be cleaned out before the end of June.

CODOIL.-Both common and Refined are very scarce in the local market. There was none cleared at the Custom House up to Friday. Prices are firm and the indications are that they will be well maintained the coming Summer. The Winter Codfishery at Rose Blanche and Vicinity was short owing to the ice on the Coast, and what fish
