Carpentier Issues Challenge.

Wichita, Kansas, June 16.—(Canadian Press)—George Carpentier, heavyweight champion of Europe, who is here to-day, issued a challenge to Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, to meet him after October 10th at any time or place Dempsey will name. Carpentier expects to return to France in July and be back in the United States after a few weeks.

Dempsey Accepts.
San Francisco, June 16.—(Canadian Press)—Jack Kearns, manager of Jack Dempsey, heavyweight champion of the world, accepted the Wichita challenge of Georges Carpentier, European champion, for a fight any time after October 10th.

"After two weeks we will take on all comers, Carpentier preferred," Kearns said. "We will fight Carpentier on or after October 10th at any place where a decision is possible and where a sufficient number of rounds to satisfy the public are guaranteed. "We would like to hear from Billy Mike, Bill Brennan or anybody under the sun who thinks he has a chance with Dempsey. But, of course, Carpentier is the big objective." Kearns announced that he would leave for the east with Dempsey within a week.
