Greek Plebiscite Favors Return of Constantine.

International Complications May be a Result--Japan Becomes Ag- gressive--Argentine Republic Withdraws From League--Sinn Fein Arrogates to Itself Powers of Life and Death.

THE GREEKS VOTE.
ATHENS, Dec. 5. The plebiscite to determine the wishes of the Greek people regarding the return of former King Constantine to the Greek throne began according to plan throughout Greece this morning.

FAVORS KING'S RETURN.
ATHENS, Dec. 5. A plebiscite held to-day has shown an overwhelming majority in favor of the return of former King Constantine to the Greek throne.

DEVIL ON IRELAND.
LONDON, Dec. 5. Pleading for the withdrawal of armed forces from Ireland as the only chance of arriving at a peaceful solution of the Irish question, Joseph Devlin, Nationalist member of Parliament for Falls Division of Belfast, speaking here to-night said the reason he was not a Sinn Feiner was that he felt it to be impossible for a little nation of four and a half millions, lacking military equipment and great wealth and with nothing but the justice of her cause to stand up against might of power. "If there were the slightest chance of success,"

he declared, he would shoulder a gun at once and be willing to die for his country. He wanted the question settled on constitutional lines. Britain and Ireland should stand shoulder to shoulder.

AGAINST THE PLEBISCITE.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 5. In the referendum held in the Greek churches here to-day there was an overwhelming majority of votes against the plebiscite in Greece. The result of the referendum, which was held for the purpose of learning the opinion of Greeks here on the advisability of a plebiscite, was made known to the Greek and Allied commissions. When the result became known there were demonstrations, in which persons known to favor the return to Greece of former King Constantine were roughly handled.

A HOPEFUL SIGN.
DUBLIN, Dec. 5. Rev. Michael O'Flannigan, acting President of the Sinn Fein, has sent the following telegram to Lloyd George: "You state that you are willing to make peace at once without waiting for Christmas. Ireland also is willing. What first step do you propose?" A Christmas truce in Ire-

land was suggested by Roger N. Speetman, Sinn Fein member of Parliament, who recently urged that advantage be taken of the Labor Commission's visit to Ireland to bring about a conference between the Commission, the Irish Labor Party, Irish Peace Conference and Catholic Hierarchy, to enlist all moderate opinion in Ireland in support of Cardinal Logue's appeal for a "truce of God."

JAPAN SEIZES MANCHURIAN SEA COAST.

LONDON, Dec. 5. A Moscow wireless message yesterday says that in revenge for the crushing by the Bolsheviks of the anti-Bolshevik bands of General Demenoff, the Cossack leader, the Japanese have seized the sea coast and closed the Manchurian frontier to the Russian far Eastern Republic.

ARGENTINE WITHDRAWS.

GENEVA, Dec. 5. The Argentine delegation officially withdrew from the Assembly of the League of Nations at four o'clock Saturday afternoon. Argentina will not resume her place in the Assembly until it has passed four amendments proposed by Honorio Pueyrredon, head of the Argentine delegation. These aim principally at securing compulsory arbitration by an international court of justice, admission of all states, and election of all members of Council instead of only four as now.

FARMERS SEEK AID.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5. Unless they are aided over the present period of price depressions, thousands of tenant farmers in Nebraska will be driven from the land. Governor McKelvie of Nebraska declared yesterday before the joint Senate and House Agricultural Committee, Edward Chassem, of Chicago, Secretary of the Farm Mortgage Bankers Association of America, asserted that the crops now in the hands of the farmers ought to be financed so that the farmers instead of speculators could get the profits.

A SINN FEIN PROCLAMATION.

BELFAST, Dec. 5. The Sinn Fein has circulated a proclamation throughout the west and south of Ireland, declaring that those guilty of "treasonable conspiracy" will be executed as traitors to the Irish Republic.

RESOLUTION RE IRELAND.

LONDON, Dec. 5. A resolution recording detestation for the murder of the police, and soldiers in Ireland and exploring the failure of the government to secure conviction of the murderers and provide for the protection of its servants and condemning as "immoral and ineffective the sins of the guilty," was passed in the course of a demonstration at Albert Hall yesterday. Former Premier Asquith was the principal speaker. The resolution also calls upon the government to abandon all attempts to repress crime by force and demands immediate action to restore the supremacy of law and order and to secure the pacification of Ireland and reconciliation with England.

HEAD OF POLISH PEACE MISSION RESIGNS.

WARSAW, Dec. 5. John Dombek, head of the Polish peace mission in Riga, and several other members of the Polish delegation have resigned because of the Diet's decision to send a Diet delegation to participate in the peace negotiations with Russian Soviets, according to Riga advices.

EXPLOSIVES UP IN FIRE.

NEW YORK, Dec. 5. A lighter loaded with explosives caught fire at Fort Hamilton dock in Brooklyn late this afternoon. A series of explosions followed the dock fire and the burning vessel was towed into the narrows. The noise of the explosion which could be heard for miles and brilliant illumination of sky drew thousands of spectators to the scene. The cause of the fire is not known.

TRAM CAR ACCIDENT.

MONTREAL, Dec. 5. Twenty-five persons were injured some fatally when a tram car traveling down Maplewood Avenue early this morning jumped the rails struck a telephone pole and split in two, the motorman was so severely injured that he will probably die. The accident occurred in a district so remote from communication that only barest details are available.

Stars Regulate World's Clocks.

The recently appointed Astronomer-Royal, Sir Frank Dyson, senior warden of the London (Eng.) City Guild of Clockmakers, is responsible for Greenwich time, which is decided by the passage of certain stars, known as "clock stars," over the incredibly thin spider's thread, which, fixed in the lens of the transit instrument at the Royal Observatory, serves as the all-important Greenwich meridian. By electricity the masterclock at Greenwich automatically fires time-guns and drops time-balls in various parts of Great Britain, and sends the word of ten a.m. to post offices and railway terminals. The Greenwich clock is one of the most accurate in the world, but it is not quite perfect, and its "rate" is daily corrected by the observations made the previous night by the "clock stars" unless clouds have hidden them. But if clouds prevented the correction of the Greenwich clock for a whole year its error in that time would be barely five seconds.

Irish Volunteers and Black and Tans

OFFEN IPPERSWATE
Dublin--Sinn Fein Volunteers and the British soldiers and police are each accused of the masquerading in the clothes of the other. Consequently it has become very difficult to ascertain the true facts and fix the responsibility for many of the reported outrages in Ireland.

Men have presented themselves at houses in British uniforms and their deeds have been attributed to government agents. But official detail that such men were operating in the districts concerned has been issued and the charges has been made that the men were masquerading in uniforms captured in one of the numerous raids on troops or police.

The same kind of story comes from the Sinn Fein side. Men claiming to be Volunteers are alleged to be government agents in disguise. This is complicated enough, but the difficulty is increased by the fact that criminals appear to be impartially personating both Volunteers and soldiers and using the incidents of the conflict as opportunity for looting.

An instance arose the other day in the Dublin police courts to which a man was charged with committing various burglaries, and it was sworn that he had offered some of the stolen property back to the owner if payment were made him as a Sinn Fein Volunteer instrumental in receiving it.



Flippers of a Seal.
Each year from 25,000 to 35,000 fur seals are killed on the Pribyloff Islands, in Behring sea.
Reckoning four flippers at eight pounds, the annual production of flippers is 100 to 140 tons.
Hitherto they have been regarded as a waste product, but the fisheries bureau finds that they will yield 67 per cent. of their weight in very ex-

cellent glue. It hopes to find a market for seal flippers with the glue manufacturers.
Rocks That Bend.
When placed in certain positions some rocks actually bend. Sandstone, for instance, if cut thin bends like a piece of India rubber. Even marble bends in some cases. Indian and Brazil both produce flexible rock which con-

tains a proportion of mica. But the mica does not account for the bending quality of the rock, which is due to the fact that the particles of quartz of which it is composed are interlocked together like hinges, with spaces in between the particles, in such a manner that though the rock will give to a certain extent it does not break.
