### Municipal Council.

#### WEEKLY MEETING.

The weekly meeting of the Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided, and Councillors Martin, Collier, Ryan and Dowden were present.

Communication was tabled from the Prime Minister, Hon. Sir R. A. Squires stating that amendments to the Municipal Act, requested by the Council, had received careful consideration by the Select Committee of the House of Assembly, and that he would have same drafted and submitted to the Legislature at the present session.

Communications were read from Capt. Whitty, Dominion Secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association, as follows:

(1) In relation to decision arrived at by the Council at a recent meeting to name a number of new streets after the Fallen Heroes of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment, that, while the Executive of the Association recognized and appreciated the attitude of the Council in seeking to perpetuate the memory of the men who fell, still they considered the discrimination which must necessarily follow should be avoided. The matter was therefore left in the hands of the Committee for further consideration.

(2) In which he asked permission to rope off streets in the vicinity of the Soldiers' Memorial, Garrison Hill, on Memorial Day, July 2nd. His request was acceded to, and the City Engineer instructed accordingly.

The Newfoundland Motor Association wrote, in reference to stone crossing at Rawlins' Cross, and hoped that when the telephone poles in the vicinity are being renewed, the Council will bear their suggestion in mind, and have placed in such a position as will permit the rounding of O'Mara's and Macpherson's corners with safety.

Request of residents of Gilbert St. to have repairs made to the sidewalk, will be attended to.

Mr. George Storer, Pleasant Street, drew attention to the unsanitary condition of property in his vicinity. The communication will be forwarded to the Health Officer.

Communication of John Skinner, in reference to water pipes near his premises, and T. J. Murphy, re surface drains fronting his dwelling, were referred to the City Engineer; whilst that of F. W. Knight, for permission to fence his property, Southside, was ordered referred to the Roads West Committee.

Mr. J. C. Baggs, Leslie Street, wrote re the necessity of having the houses on this street numbered. The matter will receive attention.

Dr. N. S. Fraser wrote re the necessity of placing sidewalks, LeMarchant Road, in good condition, so that pedestrians may use same instead of the main street. If this is done, and sign-boards placed along the road, directing pedestrians to keep to the sidewalks, he thought that there would be no necessity to close this much frequented thoroughfare to motorists on Sunday evenings, as he understood the Council intended doing. The closing of this road has never been discussed by the Council, and the suggestions re repairing of sidewalks will be carried out.

The communication of Messrs. Collins Campbell, Ltd., re "Tervia" for oiling of streets, was deferred to the next meeting.

The following tendered for the necessary repairs to retaining wall, Kichham Place:—Messrs. Hoskins & Noseworthy, W. Edney, J. Spratt. Contract was awarded Messrs. Hoskins & Noseworthy.

Application of F. Mansfield for repairs to dwelling was granted; while that of Mrs. Bancroft to shingle house Duckworth Street, was refused, unless insurable material is used, as the building in question is situated within the fire zone.

The following plans were passed, subject to the Engineer's approval:—A. W. Oldfield, dwelling, Bonaventure Avenue; F. W. Hayward, annex, Forest Road; G. Tucker, outhouse, Gear Street; C. Murphy, outhouse, Freshwater Road; G. Harris, coach-house, Hamilton Ave., providing that he gives a guarantee that the building will be used for that purpose only.

Tender of C. A. Leverman, proprietor, Canadian Clothing Co. to supply uniforms for the Inspectors, was accepted.

Reports of the City Engineer, City Health Officer, etc., for the week, were tabled.

Requisitions for several departments were acceded to, and weekly accounts ordered paid, after which the meeting adjourned.

### Germany Makes Record for Pardons.

No less than a quarter of a million persons convicted of misdemeanor or penal offences in Germany were granted complete or conditional pardon during 1921, according to official statistics. This established what is undoubtedly a world record for pardons. Since the socialistic regime was ushered in, Germany has shown extreme leniency in exercising the right of conditional pardoning. That these reforms in making out justice by giving the convicted persons another chance have shown fruit, is claimed on the basis of figures which show that there have been less than 4,000 backsliders out of those pardoned.

### Rhodes Scholarship, 1923.

Applications for the Rhodes Scholarship for 1923 must be made to the undersigned not later than Monday, the 17th of July next.

The election will probably be completed on July 26th.

Applicants must have passed their nineteenth birthday, but not have passed their twenty-fifth birthday on the first of October of the year for which they are elected.

The present value of the Scholarship is £350 a year for three years. Accompanying each application must be:—

- (a) A birth certificate.
- (b) Certified evidence as to the subjects studied, the examinations passed, the degrees (if any) taken.
- (c) A statement by applicant as to his general interests and activities, the line of study which he proposes to follow at Oxford, and the character of the work at which he aims in after life.
- (d) Testimonials from not more than four persons.
- (e) References to four persons, under at least two of whom he has studied.
- (f) Father's name, address and occupation.
- (g) A statement of war service (if any).

Ten typed copies with the originals of each of the above to be supplied.

The scholar elected will go into residence at Oxford in October, 1923.

THRILLS AND PATHOS IN "TEN NIGHTS IN A BARROOM."

Seriously speaking, "Ten Nights in a Barroom" is a spectacular rendering of a great heart interest story, well

produced and acted, and photographed superbly. John Lowell, a finished and experienced actor, plays Joe Morgan, who goes to the bad, recovers and reforms, and all through the influence of his little child, who is killed in a drunken brawl.

The part of the child is taken by Baby Ivy Ward and the little one acts the part with such tenderness that she sweeps her audiences with her in gusts of emotion, or at least that is

what happened when the picture was shown in New York's biggest theatre. "Ten Nights in a Barroom" is a classic in respect of pitilessness of theme; the barroom is the point around which so much of the grim and sombre action centers. As for entertainment, it is there in abundance.
