### American Lawyers To See Paris After Meeting at London

Dallas, Tex., July 7. (A.P.)—In response to invitations from Ambassador Jules Jusserand on behalf of the French Government, M. Tourcave, as president of the Order of Advocates of Paris, and the American Chamber of Commerce of France a large number of American barristers will attend a special reception in their honor in Paris, July 23-31. It was announced here by Robert E. L. Saner, president of the American association.

The Paris meeting, where the Americans will be the guests of the French lawyers, will follow immediately the adjourned session of the American Bar Association, to be held in London, July 20-26. A tentative program arranged includes a reception by the Paris bar at the Palais de Justice and by the municipality of Paris at L'Hotel de Ville on July 29; a reception at Versailles and Ramboillet by the president and premier, July 30, and a reception by the Franco-American committee in Paris, July 31.

The suggestion that the American Bar fix the program was made by Ambassador Jusserand. The program committee included William D. Guthrie, New York, chairman; Fred R. Coudert, New York; George Denege, New Orleans; George B. Rose, Little Rock; James Brown Scott, Washington; Silas H. Strawn, Chicago, and George W. Wickersham, New York. The entertainment of the visitors will be in charge of a committee of American lawyers practicing in Paris with Hugh A. Bayne, chairman, and the following members: Watson C. Emmet, Donald Harper, Benjamin F. Conner, Gethering C. Miller and Lovering Hill.

Headquarters for the American visitors will be maintained at 82 Avenue des Champs Elysees. About 2,000 American lawyers are expected to visit London and a large proportion will attend the Paris meeting. Mr. Saner said. Others will visit with the Bar of Scotland at Edinburgh and the Irish bar at Dublin.

### Breeding Yakalos May Augment Meat Supply

WAINWRIGHT, Alta., July 8.—(A.P.)—A new breed of livestock which may have a bearing on the future meat supply has been developed in the national park here by crossing buffaloes with yaks. Superintendent A. G. Smith says the stock has heavy beef qualities, combined with a good rustling nature.

The breed has been given the name "yakalos," which Mr. Smith believes will prove more practical than "cat-talo," evolved several years ago by crossing buffaloes with domestic cattle. "Yakalos" breed true to type, are sturdy and able to forage for themselves, he said.

More than 1,500 buffalo calves were born this year in Wainwright park, which makes up for the excess stags killed last winter. The herd now numbers 6,000 full grown buffaloes, the largest in existence and one of the remnants of the millions of bison that once roamed western prairies, according to Mr. Smith.

### With Ages Totalling 392 Years

THREE FILIPINOS PASS AWAY.

MANILA.—(A.P.)—The town of Taytay, situated only a few miles from Manila in the province of Rizal, claims the record for longevity in the Philippine Islands. From October 1923 to the end of April 1924, six persons who passed the century mark died there, according to the record kept by Father Dumandan.

One woman, Benita Gonzaga, according to the record was 140 years old when she died. Others who had lived far beyond the century mark were Tomasa Vivencio, 123 years and Maria Roxas, 129 years. Father Dumandan says he believes that the simple diet of fish, vegetables and fruit which compose the chief foods of these people, adds greatly to their long lives.
