## House of Assembly Proceedings

FRIDAY, August 1.

The House met at 2 o'clock.  
Petitions were presented by Messrs. Ashbourne and Duff from their Districts in the subject of dredging a canal and a post office respectively.

### ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.

Mr. Hickman asked the Minister of Public Works if it is the intention of the Board of Works or his Department to ask for tenders for all supplies of foodstuffs, bedding and general merchandise required for the different Government institutions.

The Minister tabled the following reply:—  
The newly constituted Board has not yet met to consider this and other matters.

Mr. Hibbs asked the Minister of Public Works if the Labour Bureau is at present functioning, and if so, to name the officials in charge, and to state the nature and extent of the present duties.

The Minister tabled the following reply:—

We have no Labor Bureau in the strict sense, but the services of certain officials who have been connected with that work are being temporarily retained by the Government pending a decision as to the Government policy in this connection. Capt. G. G. Byrne is the official in charge.

The Minister of Marine & Fisheries asked permission to reply to certain queries by Mr. Grimes re the dismissal of one George Roberts as a Lightkeeper at Manuels Island, Labrador. He said he discovered among other things that Mr. Roberts was a very expensive man. In addition to having free passage to Labrador Mr. Roberts was paid for 1921-22 the sum of \$120.00 as passage money for his assistant. Who his assistant was he did not know and could not find out. In fact there was no assistant, but Mr. Roberts was paid personally on April 18, 1923 the above amount for passages to Labrador two years previously. Then on December 12, 1923 he was paid \$35.55 for passage money, and in 1922 he was paid the passage money of his wife and from Labrador, and the same thing happened in 1923, or \$71.00 each year for his wife, which added to the other amounts make a tidy little sum. He hoped to save these amounts at least by the dismissal of Mr. Roberts.

The House then went into Committee on resolutions relating to certain expenditures under the Loan Act 1923.

The Auditor General in his report asked for authority to sign a cheque for one million dollars to liquidate an amount outstanding at the Bank of Montreal in connection with the Pitt Prop account. The resolutions passed the Committee and a bill was introduced.

The House went into Committee on resolutions in regard to a tax on goods imported in Newfoundland. This change has been recommended by the Assessor.

Mr. Hickman thought it an opportune time to discuss certain discriminations in the tariff on goods manufactured in Newfoundland. He said some industries were underprotected. He advocated a readjustment of the tariff to equalize matters. He instanced the protection on cigarettes.

He had asked the Finance Minister to table figures showing the excise duties paid on the article last year. He found there had been manufactured last year nineteen million cigarettes. It was an industry very much overprotected. It took 2½ lbs. tobacco to make 1000 cigarettes, and in the manufacture of the nineteen million 47,500 lbs. were used. The duty on imported cigarettes figured out at \$14.60 per thousand while the duty on the locally manufactured article figured out at \$8.12 per thousand, leaving a protection of \$6.48 per thousand. In approximate figures the cigarette industry was protected last year by the country to the tune of \$115,000.00. He thought no industry should be protected to this extent and he trusted the Government would see that better equalization of the tariff was undertaken. The resolutions were put through without further discussion and a bill was read a first time.

The House went into Committee on a bill relating to salaries of civil servants which repeals the old act, and civil servants will be paid the amount voted them in the estimates from July 1, 1924. The Bill was put through all its stages by unanimous consent and sent to the Legislative Council for concurrence.

The House then went into Committee on Supply.

Sir John Croble tabled the estimate for Supplementary Supply amounting to \$715,692.92 as follows:
