Mr. Wm. Johnston, M. P., who paid a flying visit to Canada last summer, has embodied the result in a lecture lately delivered before the London and Westminster Workingmen's Constitutional Association, a synopsis of which we give below:

Mr. Johnstone, M. P., who was well geolived, gave his impressions of our great colony in an inferesting narrative, entitled "A run through Canada." He described the climate, varying from that of the Arctic regions to that of southern Europe, the native riches, and contented population of the country. She possessed most of the valuable metals, and unrivalled natural means of communication, in the shape of rivers and lakes, while the soil was as rich as any in the world. The towns were growing in importance, and several now flourishing places of business stood where, but a few years since, was a wilderness. The several public institutions he visited were admirably managed, and in a small town in the Province of Ontario, students were prepared for the University for one shilling amounth. He expressed his belief that a mighty nation was growing up as loyal as ourselves; and trusted that on thing would be done in the name of statesmaship to sever its connection with us. (Cheers.)

Mr. Morgan Howard proposed a vote of thanks to the lecturer, and said they would never cease to consider Canada a part of the old country. The lecturer had not only added to our historic knowledge of the Dominion of Canada, but had raised an interest in the country which he hoped would not be confined to the metropolis alone.

The Grand Trunk Railway.

It would appear as though the pro prietors of the Grand Trunk Line have at length found a way out of the many difficulties by which they have been surrounded for so long atmic. At a special general meeting held in 1 ondon; on the 22nd ult., a heid in I ondon on the 22nd ult. a majority of the proprietors adopted, with some modifications, Mr. Mc. Ewan's scheme to raise about £2,0 v., 1890 in cash by the issue of £10,000, 1890 in cash by the issue of £10,000, 1890 in ordinary stock at 80 per cent. discount, for the purpose of completing the road with steel rails, altering the gunge, Acc., leaving the net revenue available for dividends. This scheme will, virtually, place the controlling power of the company in new hands: whether it will prove successful, remains to be seen. Thereseems to be good grounds for the belief that it will be so: and Mr. Mc. Ewan and his friends appear to be very hopeful about the result; but any one who knows anything of Grand Trunk management and speculation, and expense, will be inclined to quietly wait a little before putting implicit faith in a scheme which is to work such wonders for this unfortunate line. A decided change, we must admit, has come over the

ting implicit faith in a scheme which is to work such wonders for this unfortunate line. A decided change, we must admit, has come over the spirit of the proprietors of the company, and it would appear that they were now in a position; o escape from all their difficulties.

As the result of this alteration in the affairs of the company we may naturally expect the rapid change of guage. The proprietors hope, turing this year, to, change the guage on that part of the line between Statford and Montreal, the remaining portion to Portland being changed next year. They will also have 250 new coal-burning engines, which, together with the change, of guage will add about 25 or 30 per conf. to their carrying power; and will give them largely increased facilities for the through-traffic. Mr. McEwan and his friends have already paid £50,000, together with £50,000 more to be paid on the approval of the agreement made b, the board with them. When the Bill is approved by Parliament they will pay another £100,000. Besides this they are responsible for £300,000 more at the end of July, and £200,000 at the end of September.

This then, is the scheme as proposed by Mr. McEwan, and almost manimously adopted by the proprietors; and, "if the full measure of success promised for it by its author be realized, sceptics will be obliged to believe that the days of financial mitacles are not over."
