Killed in Toronto.
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Four Men Drowned.
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Into a Pall of Live Coals.
St. Thomas, July 9.—A terrible accident occurred at Rodney on Saturday afternoon about 4 o'clock, when the eighteen-month-old daughter of Matthew Barnes, who was sitting on a step, fell into an ash-pail filled with live coals. The child was terribly burned from the shoulders to the lower part of the abdomen. The doctor in attendance does not believe she will recover.

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Watertown, N. Y., July 9.—A special to The Standard from Sackett's Harbor on Lake Ontario says: The bodies of two men apparently 30 years old have been found on the shore of Lake Ontario. The indications are that they have been in the water some time. Neither one has been identified as yet.

Glasgow Fair Fire.
Glasgow, July 9.—A fire, which broke out in the Exhibition grounds yesterday afternoon, for a time threatened the Exhibition buildings and caused much excitement. The flames, however, were confined to a block of ten rooms, which was destroyed.

300 Lives Lost.
Tacoma, Wash., July 9.—Canton mail advices give details of the loss of 300 lives by landslides and flood, occurring at Lung Kong in June. The landslide was caused by a tremendous earthquake.

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Lockport, N. Y., July 9.—Sydney Locke, while temporarily insane, yesterday morning, shot his three children. Ruby, aged 14; Howard, aged 12; and Ermine, aged 8. The three are dead.

989 Deaths a Week.
New York, July 9.—The official figures of vital statistics show 989 deaths from heat for week ending July 6, in the five boroughs of Greater New York.

ONLY ONE COLONIAL TEAM.

42nd Annual Meeting of National Rifle Association opened at Bisley yesterday in brilliant weather. The entries generally are satisfactory, but there is a notable absence of colonial teams, Canada alone furnishing a full team. The events decided yesterday are unimportant.

The program for the entire meeting shows that some of the lessons of the Boer war have not been overlooked. The rapid-firing principle has been introduced in many of the short-distance competitions, both for teams and individuals, and efficiency in firing at extreme ranges is also encouraged. In the latter case the target will be undisturbable to the naked eye, and readily adjustable telescopic sights and artificial rests will be allowed. The most interesting competition, however, will be that founded by Lord Roberts for snap-shooting by teams, in sections of companies. THE MARKETS.

Wheat Cables Lower—Decline of a Penny Per Cent at Liverpool—Latest Quotations.

Monday Evening, July 9.
In Liverpool today wheat futures closed a penny per cent lower than on Saturday. Maize options rose 1/4 to 1/2 per cent.

THE VISIBLE SUPPLY.
As compared with a week ago, the visible supply of wheat in Canada and the United States has decreased 738,000 bushels, and that of oats has increased 1,382,000 bushels.
