poet as shown by his works. Thomas B.
Harned and Dr. Daniel G. Brinton also
made addresses and the ceremonies were
concluded by an address from Robert G.
Ingersoll, the intimate friend of Whitman.

The Sixtieth Anniversary.

Sixty years ago Mr. and Mrs. Andrew

Thompson were made man and wife at

Kelso, Roxburgh, Scotland, and the re-

currence of the anniversary of that happy

event was commemorated yesterday by a

family reunion at their residence, 433

Ridout street. Both Mr. and Mrs. Thompson

are still hale and hearty, and are

splendid examples of those vigorous

qualities of body and mind which charac-

terize the natives of auld Scotia. Mr. Thompson

was born in Kelso on

Sept. 8, 1808—over 83 years ago—

though a sturdy man, and a gentle

activity would scarce lead one to believe he

had attained that ripe age. He well re-

members when the battle of Waterloo was

built mills in the Humber district for Messrs. W. P. Howland, Wm.

Gamble, Fisher and other prominent

persons; and for Messrs. Haggart (father of

the present John Haggart) and E. W.

Thompson, near the Welland canal. In

1848 Mr. Thompson removed to Beachville,

Ont., and continued in business. Among

the well-known mills constructed for him
