THE PRINCE AND "SPORT." You will oblige by giving the information as to what is the best way of planting young maple trees taken from swampland. It has failed with many in my neighborhood. The bark gets loose all round the trees and some of them rot at the bottom. My way was to make large holes deep enough to put manure all round them at the depth they were taken out. I packed the clay lightly to them. I have watered them occasionally and put sawdust. them at the clay lightly to them. [The plan pursued with complete success on the farm where the writer resides was, in taking trees from low lying damp land, to replant at once in holes made large enough to admit roots without crushing or cramping, never watering and using no manure. Hundreds have thus been planted and with scarcely a failure. Sometimes the violent change from one soil to another has had effect; then trees replanted may be injured by excessive watering and the maple borer has killed numbers planted in London.
