feature of penal servitude in an English prison is the strictly enforced si-ence during the whole period of in-carceration. A Parliament committee recently suggested that this rule be slightly relaxed as a reward for good behavior by long-term convicts. The Home Secretary having called for observations by the prison commissioners on the recommendation, they replied that they think it would be dangerous to go back to what experience condenmed as leading to mischievous results. The worst criminals often are the best conducted prisoners, and there is grave objection to giving facilities for unchecked conversation on the ground of good conduct. The commissioners

sioners add: "We are quite able to understand that the enforcement of silence for affect or twenty years is unnatural. As a matter of fact, a well-behaved convict under a long sentence, after a certain lapse of time is employed usually in a position of trust, and is not subject to the constant surveillance which is exercised over a man in the earlier days of his sentence. More-over, he thinks that the governors, who are humane men, can safely be trusted to see that the silent system is not pushed to an extravagant degree and enforced by punishment, except in cases where they have satisfied themselves that the rule is broken for frivolous and improper purposes."

LOOKS GRAVE,

Five Thousand British Troops for South Africa.

London, April 1.—Owing to the gravity of the situation in South Africa the Government is taking steps to dispatch 5,000 troops to the Cape of Good Hope as soon as possible, in order to be ready for emergencies. The directors of the British Chartered South Africa Company, have formally requested the Government to order the immediate dispatch of 500 regular troops from Cape Town to Buluwayo.

THE MATABELE REVOLT.

Isolated Fighting Continues—Great Odds Against the British.

Capt. Nicholson reports from Buluwayo that his force is sufficiently strong to secure the town, but is not strong enough to send flying columns to many districts concurrently.


