The Daily News says that it learns Prime Minister Salisbury is not satisfied with the Sultan's verbal guarantees for the future government of the Turkish Asiatic provinces. Great Britain, the paper will add, will make further efforts to secure an effective to Rustem Pasha, the Turkish ambassador to England, of his desire that Moslems and Christians alike should equally benefit by the reforms. Continuing, the paper says that at least four of the great powers regard the present state of affairs in Turkey as dangerous and intolerable. They favor the holding of a European conference at an early date, possibly in Paris, in the spring.

GROWLS FROM THE BEAR. St. Petersburg, Oct. 31.-A dispatch to the Novoe Vremya from Vladivostock says that a British naval squadron has concentrated at Foo Chow. The paper says that Great Britain is zealously seeking a pretext to declare war against China in order to counteract Russia's success and restore her shattered prestige in the Pacific.

The St. Petersburg Official Messenger says: The thanks of Europe are not due to Great Britain alone for the solution of the Armenian question, but to the common influence of France and Russia conjointly with Great Britain. For France and Russia the question mainly centered in securing the observance of the Berlin treaty. Confidence in British sincerity in this connection was wanting.
