The board of managers of St. Andrew's Church have placed \$5,000 extra insurance on the building.

Mrs. Campbell was a devout Christian, having for many years been connected with the Lobo Baptist Church. The funeral takes place this afternoon at Lobo Cemetery.

were laid over until the estimates are prepared. Thomas S. Wall's application for permission to build a switch from the C. P. R. to his premises came up again.

Mr. Wall will be required to secure the consent of three ratepayers near whose property the switch will run.

Ald. O'Meara spoke of a scheme which will meet with the approval of wheelmen and horsemen, but probably not of the council.

He advocated the remodeling of the driveway in Victoria Park, believing that if it were kept as near the boulevard all round, as it is at present on the east side, citizens would have better accommodation and more pleasure out of the resort than they have had in the past.

Mr. O'Meara also thought provision in the shape of a "small" patch inside the horse track should be made for wheeling.

He claimed the work would cost but a trifle, and so favorably did he impress the committee with the scheme that they decided to visit the park and report later.

Complaints were made by the First Presbyterian and St. Peter's congregations against the action of the street railway company in depositing street sweepings and snow in front of the churches.
