Semi-Annual Report of Medical Officer to Board of Health.

Milkmen and Bakers Must Use New Form of Tickets-Think Block Pavement Unhealthy-Other Business of the Board.

The board of health met last night at the city hall, the members present being: Charles Taylor (chairman), Mayor Rumball, Dr. Campbell, Robert Pritchard, Wm. Skinner and Samuel Stevely, Medical Health Officer Dr. Hutchinson and Secretary Bell.

The medical health officer presented his helf-yearly report of dairies, etc. The report was as follows: The Chairman and Board of Health-

Gentiemen: I beg to submit the semi-annual re-port of the inspection of herds, dairies and milk supplied in the city during the six months ending May 15. One hundred and forty-one persons are now engaged in supplying the city with milk. Charles Rowlston, a dairyman, of Dorchester township, had been sell-ing wholesale to Edward Sloan, a city vendor. Mr. Rowiston's herd was in such an unclean and poor condition, that he was notified to cease selling. Mr. Slean now buys from another dairy. A cow showing symptoms of suberculosis was removed from one of the dairy herds.

Two samples of milk had cream added. This may sometimes occur accidentally, but where intentionally added s for publication.

The average percentage of butter-fat of all the samples collected by the in-spectors, exclusive of those having cream added, is 4.01. This is very good for the season of the year when there is no grass.

EXPLANATIONS. The herds and dairies, as heretofore,

are divided into three classes, A, B, and C, according to condition, housing and cleanliness, and the milk also into three classes, 1, 2, and 3. The first class Includes all milk having a percentage of butter-fat of 4.00 and upwards; the second class from 4.00 to 3.50, and the third from 3.50 to 3.00.

Some vendors are delivering milk in quart bottles or jars. There can be no objection to this, providing the same bottles are always returned to the same dwelling. But when this is not done, there will be more or less danger of carrying disease germs. A metal tag with a number should be attached to each bottle.

There is another matter connected with the sale of milk which calls for regulation by your board, that is, the practice of milk vendors using paste-board tickets, which in the course of time become like bank notes—filthy carriers of disease germs.

Bakers' bread tickets are open to the same objection. I would recommend that these tickets be bound in small booklets or packages, in the same way the street car tickets are bound, each ticket, when detached, being of no fur-

Order Prohibiting Sale of Liquor on the Grounds To Be Strictly Enforced.

The Officers in Charge-Regiments Filled Up With a Splendid Lot of Men-First Day of Camp Life.

More than three thousand men are now under canvas at Carling's Heights. This number comprises nine regiments of infantry and the 1st Hussars. The regiments are filled up with a splendid lot of men, and the officers anticipate excellent results from the training. The troops were all in camp before 7 o'clock. One regiment, the 28th, Perth, marched into camp with the new dress that will be used while drilling, instead of the old helmets and tunics. It consists of a gray flannel shirt, with col-lar attached, and wide-brimmed straw men and officers allike. One change that is not popular is the abolition of the canteen. Commanding officers will be held responsible for observance of the rule that nothing but "soft" drinks are to be sold.

Several regiments have bands with them. The 21st Regiment Band, of Windsor, is but by Charles Channers, at one time leader of the Sons of England Band here. The 32nd Regiment has brought a band from Seaforth. One has brought a band from Seaforth. One of the beek bands in camp is that of the 30th Wellington Rifles. Mr. James Corrison, who for 21 years was leader of the Welsh Fusiliers Band in the imperial army, is leader.
