As it was in the United States, so also was it in the English and in South American markets, and the great lumber mills in the valley of the Ottawa did not find their usual markets; they carried their lumber over. This was not all. But few of the 25,000 men usually employed in the lumber woods went thither. These men were accustomed to buy before leaving home their ordinary outfit. They bought supplies to last their families during the five or six months of their absence. When they were not em-ployed they were obliged to economize. The merchant and grocer did not sell their usual amount of supplies, but they were not the only parties affected. The farmer in the valley of the Ottawa looked to the lumberman as a purchaser of his oats and hay. These were not commodities which he had been in the habit of producing for a foreign market. They remained on his hands. When the manufacturer of agricultural implements called upon him for payment his answer was, "If you will take hay or oats I can pay you, but the lumber market is stagnant, and until it revives, my produce cannot be converted into cash." When foreign trade revived, when the English, the South American and the United States markets were again opened, payments were made; trade was again prosperous, industry was again stimulated; but all these changes were independent of the policy of the Government. They were hampered by additional taxation which had been imposed, but they were in no way helped by anything which Ministers did, and no one who will master the subject can reach any other conclusion in regard to these matters than that which
