

GERMAN YOUTHS MUST BE SOL DIERS.

To the old "inevitables," death and taxes, the German adds a third, millitary service. From the time he is old enough to go to school he looks forward and plans for it. It is said that the first great event in the life of a German boy is his confirmation and the second his first week as a soldier. A huge, red placard appears one day on the bill posting tower so familiar to German towns. It contains a list of the names of all the young men in the district who have reached military expecting it, and he knows that the authorities never forget. Already he and his parents have decided one important question regarding his service, and that is whether he shall enter as a freilwillige, or volunteer to serve for one year only, or whether he must take the full service of two years .-McClure's Magazine.
