The Paris Temps publishes a dispatch from Constantinople, which announces that Miss Helen M. Stone has been released by the brigands who have held her captive since Sept. 3 last, and has been handed over in good health to the dragoman of the American legation.

Three Austrian warships have arrived at Trieste (Austria-Hungary) and landed blue jackets to protect the harbor and the Austrian Lloyd Steamship Company's docks. Four notorious anarchists have been arrested.

Mr. Brodick, replying to a question in the British Commons regarding the remount scandal, announced that Major-General Truman, inspector-general of the remount establishment, had sent in his provisional resignation, but he would be allowed to retain his post pending the decision of the court of inquiry appointed to inquire into the charges brought against his department.

More Rioting in Barcelona—The Queen at the Theater—Duelist Gets Six Years.

London, Feb. 19.—Mr. Chamberlain yesterday met a deputation of Welshmen who desired to ask that the government provide a transport for the purpose of removing to Canada a number of their countrymen and their families who had migrated to Patagonia, and who desired a change of settlement.

Mr. Chamberlain said that when the action of the deputation was first mentioned he understood that the Welsh in Patagonia wished to emigrate to South Africa. Had such been the case arrangements could easily have been made, but the Welsh wished to remain in Patagonia, and were powerless to render them assistance to emigrate to Canada. He suggested that the deputation should call on Lord Salisbury, or that a subscription be started in the United Kingdom to raise the necessary five or six thousand pounds, or that the Canadian government be asked to receive them.

The deputation, which was greatly disappointed at the colonial secretary's reply, was headed by representative Welshmen, resident of London. The Canadian high commissioner's office was not represented.

It is reported that the quarters of the Elder Dempster Company will offer a steamship to transport the Welsh settlers to Canada.

About 70,000 Welsh settlers occupied 70,000 acres in Patagonia, divided into 350 farms, where no produce can be grown without irrigation, and where recurring floods have proved disastrous. The transplanting of this agricultural colony to Canada is advocated strenuously by the Welsh delegation.

THE QUEEN AT THEATRE. Queen Alexandra and Princess Victoria attended the performance at Mrs. Langtry's Theater Monday night. The King did not accompany them.

DUELIST GETS SIX YEARS. A Hanover cable says: Herr Falkenhagen, who killed Herr Von Bennigsen, has been convicted and sentenced to six years' imprisonment in a fortress. The duel grew out of the intimacy of Herr Falkenhagen and the wife of Von Bennigsen. After Herr Falkenhagen had killed Bennigsen, he went to Leipzig, and met the wife of Bennigsen, and she was arrested while drunk. The affair caused a great sensation.

RIOTING IN BARCELONA. Rioting was renewed in Barcelona Tuesday evening, and the police were obliged to clear the streets during extensive damage. The troops charged them repeatedly, but only succeeded in dispersing the strikers when they opened fire. The strikers were then assembled in large numbers in the outskirts of the city.

A serious collision between the troops and the strikers occurred at Sabadell, a village in the suburbs. Here the troops fired on the mob killing three and wounding six.

At Sabadell, also in the suburbs, the strikers burned the oil tax offices and a convent. Troops have been sent to Sabadell and to other places to suppress the disorders.
