#### THE WAR SITUATION

The situation in the Far East has not altered materially during the last twenty-four hours. Word comes that the Japs bombarded Port Arthur at intervals on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday. No details to hand yet. Japan is busy transporting troops to Korea, and has close upon 100,000 men ready for the advance. Little that is definite can be learned of the Russian operations beyond the fact that they are retiring towards the Yalu River. It will probably be several weeks before any fighting by land will take place. The Russians admit that the Retvizan blocks the entrance to Port Arthur badly, but they evidently intend to sit tight, and allew the Japs to maintain the aggressive. From St. Petersburg comes rumors of the early resignation of Foreign Minister Lamsdorff. The Czar is believed to be on the verge of mental collapse. The feeling between Britain and Russia has improved somewhat, the press of the latter being warned against fostering anti-British sentiment.
