REV. MR. HOWARD'S EULOGY OF "NICK"
Sermon Preached Over Remains of London's Honored School Teacher.
In the course of the services at the funeral of Nicholas Wilson at Christ Church yesterday, Rev. R. S. W. Howard made a beautiful eulogy, in which he said:
"Mr. Wilson's connection with the life of London was of the closest nature. He came to this city when London was a village, almost a hamlet. He saw all its growth and was identified with the life of its older citizens as well as the life of the younger generation. He endeavored himself to everyone, not because he tried to be popular, but because he possessed those qualities which call forth admiration and love. He not only had these in abundance, but in addition had a magnetic personality, which enabled him to retain his friends throughout his life. His pupils early learned to love their gentle, kindly teacher and admire his steadfast devotion to duty and right."
An Arthur Stringer Story.
"One of his pupils, Arthur Stringer, says that when a boy he remembers going with some other boys and looking through a chink in a fence at Mr. Wilson. It was their first view of the man whom they had heard the other boys speak of in tones which indicated both love and respect, and they saw a quiet old gentleman working in his garden. From that time Mr. Stringer loved and respected him as the others had done."
"Mr. Wilson's home life was equally happy, and he was always the kindest of fathers. To his family, not only London's citizens, but citizens of many Canadian cities, extend heartfelt sympathy in the deep loss they have sustained."

The Services.
The funeral services commenced at 3 o'clock, and prior to that time hundreds of people were present at the church, and took a last look at the old man they had all known so long and loved so well. By 3 o'clock the church was completely filled, and hundreds were unable to obtain admission. Those who were unable to do so lined the streets for a long distance up Wellington street, and in deep sadness watched the cortege as it moved slowly to Woodland Cemetery.

REV. MR. HOWARD'S EULOGY OF "NICK"
Sermon Preached Over Remains of London's Honored School Teacher.

RUSH TARIFF SAYS MR. TAFT
Urges Congress to Sidetrack Everything in Favor of the Revision.

Washington, March 18. — President Taft's message to Congress follows:
"To the Senate and House of Representatives,—I have convened the Congress in this extra session in order to enable it to give immediate consideration to the revision of the Dingley tariff act. Conditions affecting production, manufacture and business generally have so changed in the last twelve years as to require a readjustment and revision of the import duties imposed by that act."
"More than that, the present tariff act, with the sources of Government revenue does not furnish the income it ought to pay the authorized expenditures. By July 1 next the excess of expenses over receipts in the last fiscal year will equal \$100,000,000."
"The successful party elected is pledged to arrive at a revision of the tariff. The country and the business community especially expect it. The prospect of a change in the rates of the duties always causes a suspension or halt in business, because of the uncertainty as to the changes to be made and their effect. It is, therefore, of the highest importance that the new bill should be agreed upon and passed with as little delay as possible, with its due and thorough consideration. For these reasons I have deemed the present to be an extraordinary occasion, justifying and requiring the calling of an extra session."

"In my inaugural address I stated that the principle upon which, in my judgment, the revision of the tariff should proceed, and indicated at least one new source of revenue that might be properly resorted to."
"I suggest that the vital business interests of the country be considered in this session in the consideration of the new tariff, and that less time be given to other subjects in this session, which will be better for the country."
