Board of Works Hears Delegations and Lays Matter Over Again.

Mr. John Garvey, the wholesale grocer, appeared before the board of works with his war paint on last night. Mr. Garvey informed the delegation of Carling street businessmen present that he owned the sidewalk in front of his place of business and that he would drive over it and on it all he wanted to. If the delegation had anything in the way of an argument to settle, why didn't they take it into

court and "put up their money?" Mr. Garvey expressed a perfect willingness to take the matter as far as the privy council and back again, and to be even more persistent in fighting the suit than the city was in the Saunby matter.

Laid Over Again.

After hearing opinions from busilessmen on both sides of the question, the matter was laid over for one week. During the course of the debate, which at times was a three-cornered one, Mr. Garvey informed the delegation from the north side of Carling street that the street was plenty good enough for anyone to walk upon, and that he, a big taxpayer, was perfectly willing to take the middle of the street any time if it would convenience the businessmen who handled heavy stock on the south side

"The readway cost \$7,000," said Mr. Garvey, "and if it's good enough for me it's good enough for some of you people, whose taxes are only flea bites compared with mine."

Engineer Graydon gave the opinion that Mr. Garvey owned a part of the street, and that it might be a hard matter to make him quit driving his teams up on the sidewalk. His deeds show his title to the land.

A letter from the city solicitor stated that the bylaw on the matter was plain: "No driving was to be allowed on the city sidewalks."

One Team at a Time.

Mr. H. Blackburn, who appeared for the north side residents, stated that titles were frequently found defective, and that Mr. Garvey might find himself mistaken abount owning the sidewalk property. Mr. John Purdom offered the opin-
