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SOLENN TRIDUUM SERVICES COMPLETED
Memory of Madame Barat Honored at the Sacred Heart.

The solemn triduum in honor of Madame Barat, the founder of the Order of the Sacred Heart, who was beatified by Pope Pius X. at Rome on May 24 of this year, was completed at the Sacred Heart Convent yesterday, the services being brought to a close with the singing of the "Te Deum" at the conclusion of the solemn benediction.

The services of yesterday, the third day, were opened with solemn high mass at 9 o'clock, by Rev. Father Aylward, assisted by Rev. Father O'Neill as sub-deacon.

The Blessed Sacrament remained exposed on the altar until 5 p.m., when benediction was commenced. The ceremony was solemnized by Rev. Father O'Neill, the celebrant, assisted by Father O'Neill, deacon, and Father Goetz, as sub-deacon. An interesting sermon was delivered by Father Tobin, of St. Mary's Church.

Among those present were Rev. Fathers Aylward, Stanley, White and Valentine, many pupils and ex-pupils of the academy, the sister of the order and a large number of others.

CARLING STREET SIDEWALK ROW

Board of Works Hears Delegation and Lays Matter Over Again.

Mr. John Garvey, the wholesale grocer, appeared before the board of works with his war paint on last night. Mr. Garvey informed the delegation of Carling street businessmen present that he owned the sidewalk in front of his place of business and that he would drive over it and on it all he wanted to. If the delegation had anything in the way of an argument to settle, why didn't they take it into court and "put up their money?"

Mr. Garvey expressed a perfect willingness to take the matter as far as the privy council and back again, and to be even more persistent in fighting the suit than the city was in the Sanby matter.

Laid Over Again.
After hearing opinions from businessmen on both sides of the question, the matter was laid over for one week.

During the course of the debate, which at times was a three-cornered one, Mr. Garvey informed the delegation from the north side of Carling street that the street was plenty good enough for anyone to walk upon, and that he, a big taxpayer, was perfectly willing to take over the sidewalk.

A letter from the city engineer stated that the bylaw on the matter was plain: "No driving was to be allowed on the city sidewalks."

One Team at a Time.
Mr. H. Blackburn, who appeared for the north side residents, stated that titles were frequently found defective, and that Mr. Garvey might find himself mistaken about owning the sidewalk property.

Mr. John Purdom offered the opinion that the matter could be easily adjusted by Mr. Garvey agreeing to allow but one team on the sidewalk at once, and tying the horses close to the building in order that pedestrians might pass conveniently.

To this Mr. Garvey agreed, although he said he was willing to fight it out in court at any time convenient to Dr. James Wilson and others who "were always causing trouble on Carling street."

Chairman Gerry stated that in his opinion all talk of doing away with driving up to the rear of the Carling street places of business was nonsense.

"We must not hamper our businessmen in any way," he said.

To Close Nelson Street.
A petition from Superintendent Heard for permission to close Nelson street from Colborne to Waterloo in front of the hospital was laid over.

A petition from the Hyatt Avenue Methodist Church for a crossing across Hill street and the Hamilton road was granted, and the city engineer instructed to lay a suitable crossing at once.

A petition from the London Concrete Machinery Company in reference to the construction of a sewer near its place of business was laid over for a week.

A claim for damages from Geo. Lower, who was injured by being knocked off a hay by the Talbot street overhead bridge was referred to the city solicitor.

Down It Comes.
City Engineer Graydon was instructed to take steps to remove a large bill board on city property at the corner of Ridout and Horton streets.

A letter from Mr. Munson, of Chicago, re natural gas was received and the city clerk instructed to ask Mr. Munson to be present at the next meeting of the board.

A number of other matters, including the plans for St. John's Athletic Club, were discussed out and laid over for another week.

Those present were Chairman Gerry, Ald. Saunders, Ald. Stewart, Ald. Rose, Engineer Graydon, Assistant Engineer Kirkpatrick and Building Inspector Nutter.

EARL BARNES ON CIVILIZATION
Large Audience Hear Second of Series of Interesting Lectures.

St. Andrew's Hall was crowded last evening when Earl Barnes gave the second of his lectures on the civilization of the world, taking as his subject "Greece and Rome," in which he dealt with the classical age of thinkers and rulers.

"It is from the two peninsulas of Greece and Italy that our civilization comes," said Mr. Barnes. "The history of civilization can be traced back beyond 4,000 B. C. Jewish history began 2,000 B. C., but Greek history goes back beyond it. The history of Rome goes back to 750 B. C. is somewhat included in mythology."

"In the city of Troy, in Asia Minor, a high state of civilization was known as early as 1,600 B. C. Greece differs widely from Rome, largely, as a result of the beautiful surroundings amid which the Greeks dwelt. Their beautiful country aroused in them tastes in art, sculpture and literature, that have never been surpassed in the world's history. Rome, situated among many warlike tribes, with whom she was constantly engaged in conflict, became a nation of soldiers, and all that is beautiful in her art and literature is a borrowed imitation from Greece."

History of Rome.
"Rome's real history begins in 509 B. C., and by 260 B. C. she had subjugated nearly all the warlike tribes and soon afterwards conquered Carthage, a rival of whom she had been jealous for many years. Greek history is rapidly changing, owing to the splendid work the archaeologists are doing, and every year discoveries are being made that clear up many interesting points which previously were in doubt or else unknown."

"It is plain now that with the Dorian invasion the early Greek civilization was swept away. Each city in Greece, after that period, became a little state of its own and the people instead of being known as Greeks were designated entirely by the city in which they lived. The general form of government was that of an oligarchy, and there were five classes of citizens, including the slaves."

"This, particularly in the earlier ages, was productive of many internal rebellions. This state of affairs lasted for about 800 years, and in that time there was little chance for art or sculpture to develop, as the people were too busy fighting."

"Athens is particularly the Greek city which gave to the world so many priceless things. Situated seven miles from the sea, in the midst of ideal surroundings, this city developed into, perhaps, the greatest city of culture that has ever been known. Athens allied to herself a number of other less important cities and formed a confederacy. Each city was to pay so much money, and finally the Athenians turned them all against her by taking the money in the treasury and using it for beautifying their own city. It was when Athens was at the height of her power that Greek literature and art reached their highest development. The Greeks in general were a people of high ideals, and in Athens this was particularly true."

PROBING THE LYNCHING

The Tennessee State Militia Out to Curb Nightriders.

Union City, Tenn., Oct. 22.—Governor Patterson, who is in the Reel Foot Lake region investigating the lynching by Nightriders of Captain Quentin Rankin and the murderous assault on Col. R. Z. Taylor, left today for Hamburg, where the state militia, sent out to preserve order, is encamped. Fear is expressed by some that the ordering out of the militia and the offering by the governor of the largest reward permissible, might excite some enmity against him.

Sheriff Haynes, of Lake County, it is said, has a list of seventy-five men who are suspected of being members of the Nightriders gang which took part in the murder of Capt. Rankin. Monday night, and will undertake to arrest them in the next day or two.

WESTMINSTER TOWNSHIP COUNCIL.
Westminster township council met in Lambeth on Oct. 15. Members all present.

Mr. Mower, manager of the Southwestern Traction Company, addressed the council, re moving track and two poles on the corner of the second

concession and Wharfedale road; also with regard to gravel crossings. It was voted that the whole council meet at the corner referred to on the following Friday.

Mr. Wm. Gilmore addressed the council, re closing part of the second concession, east of Pond
