"MUM'S THE WORD" WITH TURKISH CABINET

Effective Way to Keep Secrets—Attendants and Secretaries Are Mutes.

London, Aug. 30.—Simmond Muenz, the well-known political essayist, has just returned from Constantinople. He brings an extraordinary account of how state secrets are kept by the new Turkish Government. He thus describes a cabinet council: "The Grand Vizier, flanked by Sheikh-ul-Islam on his right and the minister of war on his left, presides. The other ministers being distributed around the outer side of a table shaped like a horseshoe. Behind the chair of every minister stands a deaf and dumb domestic, who will wait on him during the proceedings, which are often prolonged over the greater part of a day during which the nation's rulers consume vast quantities of Turkish coffee and smoke innumerable cigarettes. On the inner side of the horseshoe sit deaf and dumb secretaries. The accomplishments of a cabinet minister thus include a working acquaintance with the deaf and dumb alphabet, otherwise it would be impossible to communicate the necessary instructions to the silent collaborators."

WEALTHY WOMAN THIEF

Minnie Cohen, Held for New York Grand Jury, Is Worth \$100,000. New York, Aug. 30.—Minnie Cohen, whose aliases include Rabinowitz and Schissel, and who is declared by Detective Cavane, of the Italian squad, to be worth more than \$100,000, was held for the grand jury by Magistrate Cornell in the Tombs court on a charge of pocket picking. The woman said she was 35 years old and lived at 48 West Fourth street. Cavane said he arrested the Cohen woman and Rosa Kameco, 25 years old, of 280 Allen street, at Catharine and South streets last Sunday. Just as Rosa lifted \$3 from the pocket of Coctia Savina, of 67 James street. According to Cavane Minnie Cohen served two and a half years in Pennsylvania upon a conviction in Allentown, also a half year in Auburn, N. J. She was arraigned in Essex Market court early in June last on a charge of shop-lifting. Cavane told the magistrate that the Cohen woman went security on a bail bond in the Harlem police court several months ago, swearing that the property she pledged was worth between \$20,000 and \$30,000.

STRENUOUS MEASURES TO REPRESS CHOLERA

Appearance in Prussia Cause for Alarm—Situation in Italy.

Bari, Aug. 29.—Reports on the cholera situation in Southwestern Italy during the past 24 hours, show that at Barletta there were six new cases and six deaths; at Trani one suspected case and two deaths; at Molfetta three cases; at Spinazzola three cases and two deaths; at Canosa one case and one death; at San Ferdinando one case and two deaths; at Trinitapoli seven cases and one death; at Margherita Savola three cases and one death. No new cases were reported today at Suvo, Bisceglie, Corato or Cerignola.

Spandau, Prussia, Aug. 29.—The death of a woman and the illness of her husband and of a male attendant at the hospital, all of the hospital attendants, have caused the health administration of Prussia to take the most comprehensive precautions against a spread of the infection.

Although the disease has not been established bacteriologically as cholera, all of the hospital attendants where the woman died have been placed in quarantine, as have fifteen families in a tenement building where the family lived.

The powder factory where the husband was employed has been disinfected, and his fellow-workmen placed under observation.

A strong police line thrown about the neighborhood prevents an approach to the tenement.

A fourth suspected case of cholera here developed today, the victim being a police sergeant.

HIGH FLYING

Airman Circles Eiffel Tower Twice at Height of 2,450 Feet.

Paris, Aug. 29.—M. Bielewicz made a sensational aeroplane flight above Paris today. He twice circled above the Eiffel Tower at a height of 2,450 feet.

PROMINENT FEATURES OF JAP-KOREA TREATY

The Existing Korean Schedules Regarding Imports Continue For Ten Years.

Washington, Aug. 29.—The treaty between Japan and Korea, by which the Hermit Kingdom is annexed as a sovereign part of Japan, has been made public to the state department. In addition to the text of the convention, a declaration of the Japanese Government concerning the effect of the annexation upon powers enjoying treaties with Japan is made public.

Existing Korean schedules, covering imports from foreign countries and regulations governing coasting trade, will be continued for ten years. The copyright and patent laws of Japan will be extended to Korea.

Japan's statement asserts that the efforts of both the Japanese and Korean Governments to reform the administration of Korea, carried on for four years, have shown that the existing system of government in Korea is not able to preserve peace and tranquility, and that the spirit of suspicion and misgiving dominates the whole peninsula.

"To maintain peace, promote the prosperity and welfare of the Koreans, and to insure the safety of foreign residents," the statement continues, "it has become clear that fundamental changes in the regime are necessary, and to that end the treaty of annexation has been signed, effective Aug. 29th."

The treaty provides that as treaties hitherto concluded by Korea with foreign powers cease to be operative, Japan's existing treaties shall be applied so far as practicable. Korea's existing open ports will be continued, except Masampo and Shinwju, will be newly opened.

Provision is made for the support of the members of Korea's imperial family, for peerage grants to deserving Koreans, and for the appointment of Koreans wherever possible to administer the country's affairs.

COOK'S FAKING IS FULLY PROVED

Exploring Party Examined the Place He Called Mount McKinley's Peak.

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 30.—Belmore Browne and his party arrived here on the steamship Portland from Valdez. Professor Herschell Parker, who with Browne headed the Mount McKinley expedition, however, retained in Valdez his ill health.

The party went in from the south, establishing a base camp on the Taek-ta River, three miles above its junction with the Chukchee. At the mouth of the river, about 10 miles from the terminus of the Moraine of the Ruth glacier, named by Dr. Cook for one of his daughters.

For fifty days and nights the party marched wearily back north over this great expanse of ice, 25 miles in width, seeking in vain for an opening up the mountain side. At the end of the every day the party was forced to climb up the steep cliffs of ice overhanging at their tops by billions of tons of snow that incessantly broke and plunged downward. Belmore Browne says:

"With Dr. Cook's photograph in our hands we found the spot they call the peak, and with a dozen or even fifty photographs we are able to prove that he sat on a saddle below one of the lesser peaks and snapped his camera for the next picture. We can show every rock and every outcrop just as his photographs disclose them."

"Our highest altitude was a figure it was about 10,300 feet, about 6,000 feet higher than Dr. Cook climbed."

THE UNWRITTEN LAW SAVES THE GIRL

Jury Acquits Mamie McLoughlin of Murdering Her False Lover.

New Orleans, Aug. 30.—Mamie McLoughlin, a girl of 18, who shot and killed Hugh Smith, Jun., a rich saloon keeper, as he walked the streets with her rival, was acquitted by a jury in the criminal court here on a plea of the "unwritten law."

The jury was out only twenty-five minutes. The announcement of the verdict was received with cheers by the members of the Era Club, an organization of women, and the other spectators who filled the court room. During the trial the girls fought with the deputies and policemen for admittance.

Miss McLoughlin took the stand just before the case was rested without argument.

"He seduced me," she sobbed. "He had promised to marry me, but he did not keep his word. I went to the house of the Blake girl. I saw her come out. I thought that she was going to meet Smith. I followed her. I found that my supposition was correct, for he met her at the corner of St. Charles avenue and Felicite street. I followed them and when I got near her rival, I was seized by a man who I did not know what I was doing. Life was worth nothing to me any longer. So I killed him."

Alice Blake, the girl who was with Smith, also wept. When she was flashing eyes she swore that she had been engaged to marry him before "that creature shot him." "The McLoughlin girl told me that I would have to give up Smith or she would kill us both."

Ever since the McLoughlin girl killed Smith the women of the Era Club and others through the state banded together for her protection from any consequences of her act. They raised a fund to hire good lawyers and in every way assisted the girl.

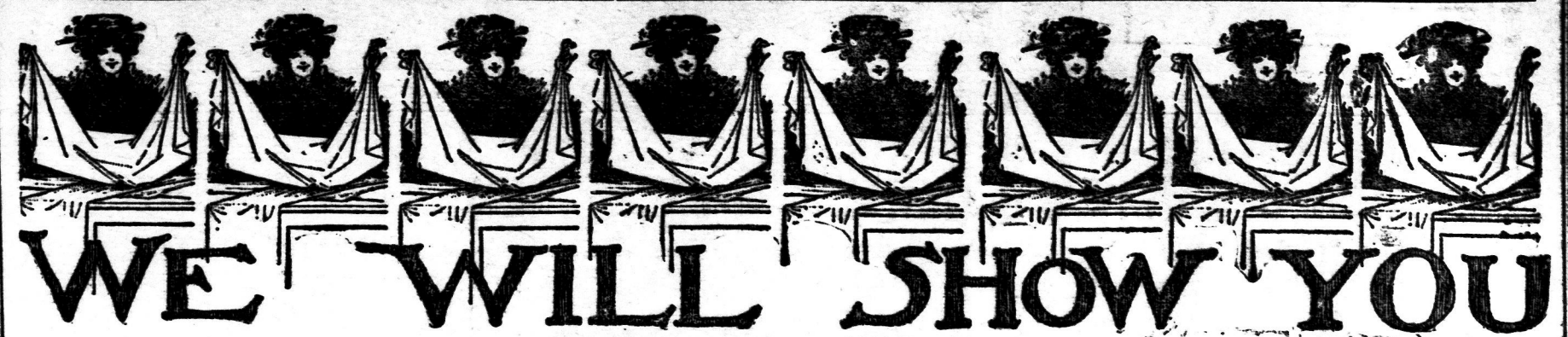
The formal opening takes place today, Major-General Sir Robert Baden-Powell performing the ceremony.

MICHIGAN STATE BOARD PROBES DURAND WRECK

Certain Admissions Are Made By Brakeman Graham, Who Was On Wrecked Train.

Battle Creek, Mich., Aug. 28.—That he knows practically nothing about the first principles of railroad engineering, had never passed any kind of an examination, and had refused employment as a conductor because he did not think he knew how to run a train, was the startling admission made by G. M. Graham, brakeman on the ill-fated Grand Trunk passenger train, No. 14, to State Railroad Commissioner Scully here last night. In the afternoon Graham testified at a private inquiry held before the Grand Trunk officials here, and he declared his evidence given then was the same as given to Commissioner Scully.

"I have only worked for the Grand Trunk since the 25th of last July," said Graham, "and never did any railroad work before. I came here to accept a position as a strike-breaker, but I am not married to the job, and have refused to go out on the road since the accident. When I accepted the position I did not fill out a written examination paper, and was not asked to. I did not know the law required that one be made out, as I knew absolutely nothing about the business. It was for this reason I declined the offer of the company to go to work as a conductor. I told them a brakeman's job was good enough for me."

"When I went back to flag No. 14, I went back as far as I could walk in five minutes, carrying two lanterns with me, one red, one white. I could see No. 4 standing at Durand depot, a mile away. When she came close enough to see my lamps, I began to swing them both together, the red and the white, but the train never stopped, and I only stepped from between the rails in time to save being run down. Then the crash came, and I walked back to see what I could do."

Asked if the rear lights were out on No. 14, Graham stated they were, and that when he reached the

wrecked Pullman he found one lying on the ground, but still burning, while the other had been extinguished. In view of his knowledge that the entire rear of the Pullman was smashed in and telescoped, Commissioner Scully laughs at Graham's story about having his rear lights in their proper place, and declares it impossible that one lamp could be still burning after the collision, had they been hung on the rear end of the car as directed by standard railway rules. When asked where he had been spending his time since the wreck, Graham replied that it was nobody's business.

The state railway commission will send out orders for every person who had the slightest connection with the operating of the trains last Wednesday night to appear before it at an early date, when a public investigation will be held. The Grand Trunk is criticised for refusing to admit the press representatives to yesterday's inquiry.

68 WEDS 61

Gushing Young Lovers in New York Decide To Be Linked for Life.

New York, Aug. 29.—Dr. Faneuil Dunkin Weiss, dean of the New York College of Dentistry, has just married Mrs. Mary Church Ripley at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Clarence Lewis, at No. 132 East Thirtieth street. Dr. Weiss is 63 years old, and Mrs. Ripley is 61. The doctor's first wife died some years ago.

Mrs. Ripley, in her application for the marriage license, declared she was an attorney. She has several married daughters.

Rev. Dr. William Grosvenor, rector of the Church of the Incarnation, officiated at the ceremony. The couple probably will make their home in the house which has been occupied for several years by the distinguished surgeon, at the corner of Irving Place and Gramercy Park.

Dr. Weiss organized the American Veterinary College, and for years he served as president of the board of trustees. He is the founder of the New York Dermatology Society, and has been a frequent contributor to medical journals, besides being an author of text-books on anatomy.

DEATH AT THE DANCE

Two Men Killed and One Fatally Shot in Arkansas Dance Hall.

Marlana, Ark., Aug. 30.—Two negroes were killed and three others injured while John Russell, a white man, was fatally shot at a dance at Russell's yesterday. News of the fight reached Marlana nearly 24 hours later, when a negro came for coffins.

Russell attempted to end a quarrel between Mack Harvey and his wife. Russell left the dance hall, and when he returned with two officers to arrest Harvey, Harvey started shooting. More than 50 shots were fired.

BURGLAR POSED AS DOCTOR

Said to Have Stolen Diamonds and Jewelry Worth \$3,500.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., Aug. 30.—Diamond rings and other jewelry, valued at \$3,500, stolen from Mr. and Mrs. Frank P. Rambo, of No. 1927 North Thirty-second street, Philadelphia, at a hotel at the Delaware Water Gap last week, may be recovered through the arrest of Buffalo of William McDermott.

It is charged that McDermott registered at the hotel under the name of a physician of Philadelphia and that he became acquainted with the Rambos and later when they were out succeeded in gaining admittance to their rooms.

BIG LINER DAMAGED.

Quebec, Aug. 30.—As the result of touching ground in the Straits of Belle Isle, the Manchester Line steamer Manchester Engineer is now on her

way back to Quebec. The extent of her damage is not yet fully known, but it is understood that her forecastle is taking water.
