THE GREAT AND ONLY BACON

This suggestion that Lord Bacon edited the "Authorized Version" of the Bible is far from being the wildest and most improbable of the Baconian hypotheses. But still, if that vast toiler did all that his undiscriminating ad mirers ascribe to him, it seems cruel to add a straw to the camel's back.

We know that Bason was very busy smoothing things down in the turbulent parliament of 1610, and composed about that time two or three learned works in Latin. No doubt also he was developing in his laboratory the epoch-making theory of the circulation of the blood, later claimed b or for the impostor Harvey. The

"Tempest," a drama absurdly attributed to an actor blackguard called Shakespeare, was composed about 1610; though of course such a trifle was the mere play of an hour. Two or three other dramatic squibs like "Pericles," "Timon" and the "Winter's Tale" were let off about that time. There was likewise a tiresome law practice alwaysoccupying the day, while parliamentary and literary labors consumed the night. Bacon was thinking tragic ally of himself when he wrote "Mac beth has murdered sleep." Hard put to it for time, he evolved in his gigantic mind an invention which unfortunately, like many proofs of his voluminous authorship, perished with him; this great benefactor of the race found the way to make two hours grow where there was but one before the 24-hour day he made to hold 48, and then worked overtime. was two days, that accounts for his superhuman accomplishment.

Had he not discovered America. paper, and furnished Columbus with the chart? Was he not probably the same person as the enchanter popularly called Roger Bacon, the inventor of gun-powder? He introduced mathematics from Arabia, and invented or discovered logarithms and the differential calculus. It was he who sowed the wind and reaped the whilrwind that knocked out the Spanish Armada. He established the Church of England, inaugurated to China. After writing the literature of his mother's (Queen Elizabeth's) era, and laying down the theory of evolution, he died, full of years and secrets nobly kept. .

GOING SOUTH AFTER ALL.

The Canadian railway companies have taken a patriotic course in the other hand meanwhile. Minneapolis at the same rate as to Fort William and Port Arthur, This sensible and simple expedient will relieve in some degree the blockade which has been bearing severely on the grain growers of Saskatchewan, A dispatch from Swift Current illustrates the hardship:

"George Gray, a young and hardy looking homesteader, drove 40 miles to Swift Current, arriving Thursday morning, with a load of beautiful wheat, No. 2 northern at the least. with a yoke of oxen, being two days on the road, only to be told that all chance to get a car.

"For two days he stayed in town. trying to sell that load of wheat, to buy coal and supplies to take back home. Refusals came one on top of another, until Saturday in despair he sold his wheat for 45 cents a bushel that was listed at Minneapo lis at \$1 04%.

The weather is mainly responsible or the congestion of traffic. Many millions of bushels of wheat could not e threshed before lake navigation closed. As a result, the terminal elevators at Port Arthur and Fort William were flooded, and the storage capacity of the interior used up, before a great deal of the crop was ready for market. The railways have now practically provided another outlet by lowering their rates to Mineapolis and answered. Duluth. Some of the wheat will be ground in American mills for export. and will pay practically no duty, but the bulk of it will be taxed 25 cents a bushel to cross the frontier, thanks to the defeat of the reciprocity agree-The American price is from 10 to 15 cents a bushel higher than the price on the Canadian side of the border, and the loss to the Canadian farmers on last year's crop alone by the rejection of reciprocity may be
