

RED ROWE PLAYED ON TEAM WITH THORPE

Ottawa Catcher Was Teammate of Indian During His Professional Career.

Ottawa, Jan. 30.—Now that Jim Thorpe has confessed his professional association, it is not out of place to hear what Red Rowe has to say about the great athlete's diamond ability. Rowe played with Thorpe in the Carolina Association on the very occasion the Indian was pulled up.

"Thorpe is a great ball player, and it is a surprise to me he has not broken into the big leagues," Rowe said. "In fact, like his ability on the athletic field, he is an all-around man in baseball. He is a bad man when he sulks, and I remember one occasion he got six policemen to handle him, two of them going to sleep from coming in contact with Jim's right fist."

Chief Garlow, the Hamilton pitcher, was a great friend of Thorpe's, and both played on the Carleton Place team last summer. It is somewhat surprising Coach Clean Warner, knowing Garlow played professional ball in the Canadian League last summer, permitted him to play against all the American college teams on the gridiron. The only game in which he didn't participate was against Toronto University.

URGE NECESSITY OF BEAUTIFYING STREETS

More Parks and Better Kept Thoroughfares Have Been Suggested.

Sarnia, Jan. 30.—A local paper has pointed out that it might pay to beautify Sarnia with a park or two, well-kept streets, and so forth. The idea has aroused a certain amount of interest. The town is one of the most favorably located in the Dominion, and the natural scenery surrounding it is unexcelled.

The municipality itself, however, is far from what it ought to be so far as cleanliness and neatness is concerned. Front street in particular is far from prepossessing in appearance, and this is about the first street that a traveller entering the town would notice. It has been suggested from time to time by certain progressive citizens that an esplanade be built along the river side of Front street from that point near the entrance to the Northern Navigation, where the sidewalk is now discontinued. It is at the Northern Navigation Company's dock that the White Star Line boats stop in summer, and many think it would pay to beautify this particular portion of the street.

GATE FACTORY TO DOUBLE ITS PLANT

More Men Will Be Taken On in the Spring.

Sarnia, Jan. 30.—The Regal Gate Company, one of Sarnia's growing industries, intends to enlarge its capacity during the coming spring. The concern was formerly located on the shore of Sarnia Bay, but some time ago moved to a new site to the south of the Sarnia Fence Company. The industry is now turning out on an average of 70 gates a day, but it has been decided to double the capacity of the plant. An addition of one hundred and ten feet in length will be built, which will mean an increase in the working force. About thirty men are now employed at the place.

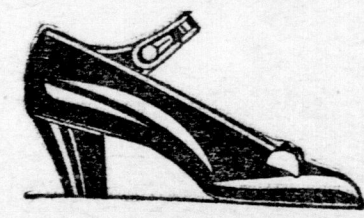

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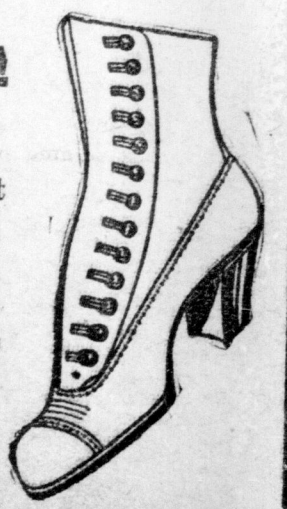

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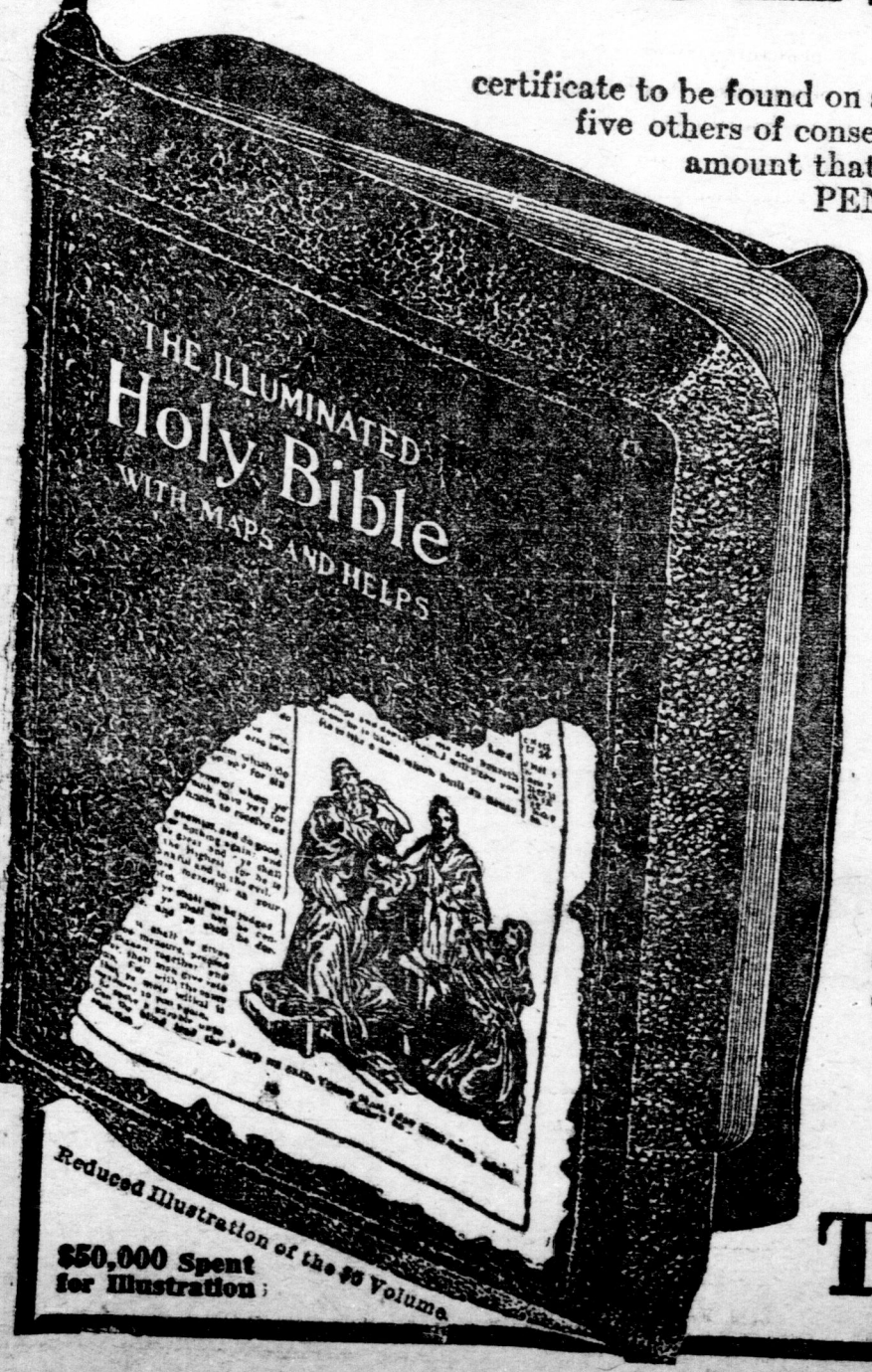
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
