OH, MR. DUFF.

H. Mr. Duff, how do you do? Your onstituency has shown a wonderful, quite a touching trust in you. That 1,000 majority has a fine, careless, confiding tone about it. Being so honored in your own county, you really can't be much of Aster of agriculture. But up where you live, the folks are in raptures over you. You can't be beaten in an election, that

much is evident. But by the way, are you going to do anything for agriculture in this province? You know, you and your confreres can't live for ever by the ideas of your predecessors in office. You are splendid fellows for going on in the path, blazed by Mowat and Ross, two of you quite energetically, the rest asleep on the wagon among the casks. But, haven't you one glimmer of a new idea now that a decade has run round and times are changed?

They are particularly changed in the rural parts of old Ontario, more so than anywhere else in eastern Canada. And not for the better! The census of 1911 told a staggering tale-ten thousand lost in the grand agricultural county of Huron, losses in Bruce, Middlesex, etc. Since 1911 this rural decline is going on, If anything even faster. We are to have a member less at Ottawa from Middlesex. Have you nothing for it, Mr. Duff? You may remember that back in July

1913, the Mail and Empire said: "It is true that the Agricultural Department has not kept pace with the advance in other branches of

This is a knock from a friend. Mr Duff. Perhaps, you might get somebody like Dr. Seath or Dr. Merchant to do everything for you. Would you like to be a megaphone like Dr. Pyne?

Perhaps, after all, you will have to with some ideas, and then, gradually, push you into carrying them out. It took years of perseverance on the Opposition's part to drive the Government into workmen's compensation. Our Government sits on a sort of Olympus, divinely appointed to rule. If there is to be abolition of the bar, it alone must do the work, not the "Grits." For them to take such a work into their own hands, or workmen's compensation, or tax reform, or agricultural, or educational re-adjustment, would be sacrilege. Legislation is mine, saith the Ontario Tory. The only way, then, Mr. Duff, for an agricultural advance is to keep praying to you, telling you what is wanted, and by and by you will perhaps be so gracious as to answer our prayers.

IN THE ADVERTISER'S FIELD.

W HILE the general results of the election over the province have Rock. not been as satisfactory as we could desire, yet throughout that portion wherein The Advertiser circulates, there has been no reason for discouragement This embraces some thirtytwo constituencies under the redistribution-the same territory constituting thirty-one at last election. In 1911 these constituencies returned 20 Conservatives and 11 Liberals. This year we have 17 Conservatives and 15 Liberals. As examination of the figures for each riding shows even

better results. In the County of Brant a Conservative majority of 560 has been turned Into a Liberal majority of 384.

Elgin still remains Conservative, but a maojrity of 1899 has been cut down to 1162, despite the effort to carry public sentiment with the promse of radial railways.

Essex sent two Conservatives to the ast legislature. It was re-arranged into three ridings, evidently with a view to providing a safe place for Dr. Reaume. But the scheme failed, and Essex is now represented by three Liberals.

Huron County will still send to Toronto two Conservatives and one Liberal; but the Conservative majority of 350 has been reduced to 157. In boasts. Lambton, unfortunately, we lost the seat that had been gained by Mr. Mc-Cormick with a majority of 89 in 1911. But the total Conservative maority of the county has been reduced rom 972 to 862 at Mr. Hanna's ex-

Middlesex has now two perals and one Conservative member, reversing the record of 1911; while the Liberal majority of the former election has increased from 260 to 448.

Norfolk has not changed its representatives; but the Conservative majority of 49 is now a Liberal ma-Jority of 1104.

Wellington has now two Liberals and one Conservative, as against one Aberal and two Conservatives elected A sort of all-around knocker. in 1911; while a Conservative majority of 238 has become a Liberal majority

large majority as usual; but the total vote cast for him was only 4,352, out of a total of 12,500, as against 5,083 in 1908, the last time in which there was contest. The Minister of Power is growing weaker each year in his own nome constituency. The city has been growing rapidly, but its member's political strength has been diminishng. With a good candidate, like Dr. Stevenson, earlier in the field, and with better organization on our part, Sir Adam's majority would have ap-

preached the vanishing point. Against this excellent record we have to admit the diminished vote of the Liberals in Oxford and Perth. In both those ridings, we are informed that local considerations had much to do with the result; and especially the persistent and virulent attacks on Mr. Rowell. The cry was "Anything to beat Rowell." They did not succeed n defeating him, but they certainly injured him and his colleague in the

ounty of Oxford. We hoped for better results, and did what we could to secure them. And if we have not got all we wanted, we got enough to encourage us for the present, and to cheer us for the
