## MISSIONARY BUILDER IS SENT OUT BY METHODISTS

Will Superintend Erection of  
Mission Edifices in China  
Field.

Toronto, July 31.—The appointment of Mr. Wm. C. Leonard, of Edmonton, Alta., as a missionary builder by the sub-committee of the Methodist Missionary Society of Toronto, marks practically the beginning of a building staff of experienced contractors to supervise the necessary building in China.

The appointment is unique inasmuch as he is only the second experienced builder that has been sent to China by the Methodist Church for missionary purposes. The other builder left some four years ago, together with one of Toronto's architects, Mr. F. E. L. Abrey. Since their arrival in China, modern buildings, including houses, churches, schools and dispensaries, have been erected. But the increased importation of missionaries, together with the advanced stages of missionary work, has made the situation much too extensive for the small staff to cope with. There is still and will be for some time a much felt need for additional help.

Until recent years the various missionaries were compelled to do all their own building in spite of their lack of experience. It is, therefore, to relieve evangelistic, medical and educational needs that the Methodist Church is seeking applicants.

Mr. Leonard has had years of experience in his trade.

## WORLD'S BIGGEST FARMER IS DEAD IN ENGLAND

Sir Richard Powell Cooper Had  
Numerous Farms All Over  
the Empire.

New York, July 31.—A London cable says:  
Sir Richard Powell Cooper, who died at his home in Beckenstead yesterday at the age of 86 years, was probably the biggest farmer in the world.

He had numerous farms in many parts of England, an experimental station, farms of spacious proportions in the antipodes and North and South America. The smallness of England's food resources was a matter that gave him much concern. It was his idea that a government bonus should be given farmers who would keep wheat stacked over until the spring or early summer months, when the reserve supply falls lowest.

He is succeeded in the baronetcy by his son, R. A. Cooper, an ardent tariff reformer and Unionist member of Parliament for Walsall.
