**SOLDIERS' INSURANCE
LAID OVER BY BOARD**
Special Conference Will Be
Held To Drown Up Scheme
For Protection of Men.

If all afternoon meetings of the board
of control are as short and sweet as
that of yesterday, then it is a safe
bet that the controllers will be very
strong for the change in meeting time.
Less than an hour was occupied in
the meeting, and the fact that a number
have left London for the front without
protection, caused the whole
question to be laid over. A special
conference will be held with local in-
surance managers and actuaries in
order to arrive at some comprehensive
scheme that will provide protection for
all who have answered their country's
call and enlisted.

The day standing question once more
made its appearance. It was laid over
pending a report from the police com-
missioner.

Meredith, it was decided to postpone
any action in preparing a by-law for
the submission to the electorate on the
stockyards question until after the city
of London bill had been given the royal
assent in the Provincial Legislature.

ST. ANDREWS-BY-THE-SEA.
Few of the visitors to St. Andrews
realize that the district has a history
association, Champlain landed near the
present site of St. Andrews in 1604,
when he came from France with a
patent royal of all the territory in
America between the 40th and 46th de-
grees of latitude. When the independ-
ence of the United States was estab-
lished, the U. S. L. came across the
border and settled at St. Andrews, and
there are still houses standing in the
town which were brought by them from
Maine. There is quite a contrast be-
tween the latter and the spacious New
Algonquin, which has just been rebuilt
by the C. P. R.

**TO ENTER PROTEST
AGAINST NEW LAW**
Temperance Workers of City
to Gather in Auditorium
Tonight.

TO SUBMIT RESOLUTIONS
"Drys" To Make Last-Minute
Effort To Secure
Amendment.

Resolutions asking the Provincial
Government for more advanced tem-
perance legislation than that fore-
casted in its recent proposals will be
submitted to a mass meeting of citi-
zens in the Y. M. C. A. Auditorium at
8 o'clock this evening, and trans-
mitted to Toronto tomorrow. This was
decided at a meeting yesterday of min-
isters and laymen representing the
Municipal Alliance, the W. C. T. U.,
and the licensed reduction committee.
The suggestion for a mass meeting
came in the form of a resolution from
Rev. J. H. Bingham, who, without
his belief that, even if at this late hour
it was found impossible to induce the
Government to change its mind, the
expression of such a mass meeting
would have the effect of stirring up
public opinion on the question, not
only in this city, but throughout West-
ern Ontario.
Strong Action Needed.
The time had come, he said, when
strong action was needed. Prominent
men in all parts of the empire, who
never before had expressed themselves
publicly on the question, now were de-
claring in favour of prohibition. The
terrible evil of the liquor traffic,
Britain at the present time was
needing help on the Rhine, but she
was in no better position than we are
in fighting the liquor evil, and the
people of Canada, by taking a firm
stand in this city, but throughout West-
ern Ontario.
It had been stated, he pointed out,
and there was no doubt about the
truth of the statement, that more
people were killed as a result of the
liquor traffic than lost their lives
through the activity of the German
submarine.
Some of those present advanced the
argument that the notice was rather
short for arranging a mass meeting,
but the general opinion was that the
Legislature probably would pro-
ceed before Easter it was decided that
today was the latest time to make
it held if it were to have any effect.
The arrangements as to speakers,
enacted last night by the committee,
composed of Revs. W. R. Mc-
Intosh, T. H. Mitchell, G. N. Hazen,
and J. H. Boyd, Professor J. H. Boyd,
man and old-time writer, to Rev. W. J.
Bingham, Joseph P. Pack, W. J.
Blackie and J. C. Mottishaw was as-
signed the task of advertising the
meeting in the most effective way.
The resolutions were not drafted last
night, but the following were appointed
to prepare them when they have been
prepared: Rev. Dr. J. C. Mottishaw,
of the First Congregational Church;
Rev. D. C. MacGregor, of St. Andrew's
Presbyterian Church; Professor Pat-
erson, of the Western University, and
Ald. Daly.

**ALLIANCE DISCUSSES
LEGISLATURE'S FAILURE.**
The Ministerial Alliance of the city,
at a special meeting yesterday, called
for a comprehensive review of the
Provincial Government's proposal for
temperance legislation and also to con-
sider the local situation, passed resolu-
tions asking the Legislature to amend
its enactment in such a way as to
meet the high level of public opinion,
and urging the provincial secretary to
use his initiative in instructing the
license commissioners to give effect
to the wishes of the people of the
city as expressed in the petition.
The first of these two resolutions
was amended at the suggestion of
Rev. W. M. Walker, a member of the
alliance suggesting to the Government
that one main point of legislation
which the alliance believes will not be
in advance of public opinion, and
present time would be the extension of
the prohibition applied to the soldiers
at least until the war is over, and
that this measure be not rescinded
afterwards except with the ex-
pressed consent of the Legislature.
