# SOCCER KICK-OFFS

Say it with flowers—Scotland 3, England 0.

With Scotland's magnificent win over "merrie" England last Saturday "Auld Scotland" has proven herself to be the champion Soccer country in the world.

The Scots' victory over the Rose was a meritorious one and the wearers of the Thistle proved to the westward that the Rose that they can still teach the English how to play the finer points of the grand old game, although the latter at times are very slow to acknowledge it.

Owing to the miners' strike and the curtailing of passenger service on the steam railways a record soccer game failed to materialize; there being only 100,000 fans present to witness the great combat.

Ireland despite her poor showing in the soccer gridiron has at least got one consolation left in the fact that it was "Erin go bragh" that introduced the penalty kick.

One of the Zimmerman junior players of Hamilton was ordered off the field for misconduct by the referee during the second period of his team's game against Homestead, played in Hamilton last Saturday and he refused to go, threatening the referee with all sorts of trouble.

The referee being a strict disciplinarian immediately brought the play to a sudden close and awarded the game to the Homesteads.

It's folly of the worst kind to defy the referee.

# REFORMERS CURE SHRINES

But at the end of January a serious fight occurred at Tarn Taran in the Amritsar district. A band of reformers suddenly appeared there, succeeded in getting possession of the shrines only after losing two lives. Some persons altogether were injured.

The old Sikhs had a meeting at Lahore the day before the attack at Nankana, which, it had been rumored, had been impending for some time. Apparently the reformers numbered about 200, but how the fight began is not known, says the report.

The deputy commissioner who started his investigation the day that the fight occurred, was told that the Mahants had been victorious. The fight had taken place inside a small shrine in enclosure which was commanded by houses on all sides.

The inquiry into the facts, concluded the report, "was hampered by crowds of excited Sikhs from all parts of the Punjab, who accused the Moslem neighbors of the shrine of having assisted the Mahants."
