Shoulder pork sells for 20 to 25 cents per pound, fresh hocks at 12 cents, and salt hocks at 10 cents per pound, and bacon is not up at 40 cents. People have a sweet taste for the choice cuts."

"But the cheaper pork is not left on your hands?" suggested the reporter.

"To a certain extent it is," replied the butcher, "The cheaper cuts do not all go. The average butcher does not handle the whole hog, and the packer's price is gauged on the percentage of what he buys. It is a long way from the pig walking around to the butcher's block, and contrary to the way things used to be, the packer must get his profit."
