But you will find men refusing good wages. We hear them at this moment discussing whether they will accept a certain reduction. I speak now of the railroadmen. They are not playing the game. I hate to say it, but the professions are going on strike too. It's hard to say these things, but look for a moment at the public and high school teachers who have gone on strike, and I have even heard the ministers asking for more money also."


