

WESTERN "U" OPEN TO ALL CLASSES

Compilation Shows Difference
in Vocations of Pupils' Parents.

That Western University serves all classes in Western Ontario is evidenced by a list compiled by Dr. Sherwood Fox, dean of the college of arts, showing the occupation of parents of students attending this institution. These occupations range from those of professional men, dairymen, horse dealers, ranchers to caretakers, baseball players, sailors and street railway trackmen. The information has been prepared in view of the fact that ratepayers of London are being asked to vote the sum of \$250,000 toward the expenses to be incurred in the erection of new arts buildings for Western University. Voting on this question is to be held December 5, and the information clearly indicates that the vast majority of the "rich men's sons" of the district. Building operations for the new arts buildings are planned to commence in 1922, and the Ontario Government has already pledged a grant of \$300,000, with the county of Middlesex offering an additional \$100,000 to erect a building as a memorial to the soldiers who died in the great war. These grants are conditional on the citizens of London subscribing their share towards the cost of maintenance of Western University.

BOTH ULSTER HOUSES TO MEET NOVEMBER 29

Belfast, Nov. 19.—Both houses of the Ulster Parliament have been called by their respective speakers to meet Nov. 29.

When Parliament adjourned Oct. 4, until Dec. 13, it was announced by Sir James Craig, the premier, that arrangements had been made to summon it to meet at an earlier date in case of emergency. There might be developments rendering such a step necessary, he said.

In addition to receiving the report of the Ulster cabinet on the Irish negotiations, the Parliament will deal with the transfer of various governmental services from the Imperial Parliament to the North Ireland executive body.

7 DIE AS TRAIN HITS FUNERAL PROCESSION

Chicago, Nov. 19.—Seven persons were instantly killed and a funeral procession, in which they were riding, was demolished when a fast Santa Fe train crashed into the machine as it was crossing the tracks between Summit and Lyons, this morning. The bodies of the victims' bodies and fragments of the machine were strewn along the track for nearly a mile. The accident occurred at a bend in the road and it was thought the driver was unable to see the approaching train on account of a driving snowstorm.

MEIGHEN CLOSES WESTERN TOUR

Claims Government Will Not
Lose by Accepting
Riordan Note.

Regina, Sask., Nov. 18.—(Canadian Press staff correspondent.)—Premier Meighen closed his brief stay in Saskatchewan last night and left for the east after addressing an audience of approximately 5,000 people. Today he speaks in his own constituency at Portage La Prairie, which meeting will bring his western campaign tour to a close.

At last night's meeting Mr. Meighen opened with a discussion of the railway problem, stating that he was sure that he knew what the Government railway policy was, but he was at a loss to know what the Opposition leaders had to say on the subject.

In reply to a question about "notes," Mr. Meighen again explained that by the acceptance of a promissory note from the Riordan Company in lieu of \$5,000,000 excess profits tax, the Government would not lose a cent.

"Campaign funds" was shouted by another interrupter and Mr. Meighen replied: "Campaign funds from a bank organization—let us leave these netherworld issues and turn to something worth while."

Regarding the grain pool the premier said the Government was trying to see that every last cent which could be obtained from the sale of wheat found its way into the pockets of the men who produced the wheat.

He went on to say that Mr. King had spoken in Regina without saying a word on the subject, which was of vital importance to the people of Western Canada. He proposed to think it over after he got into power, Mr. Meighen said. There was applause from a group in the audience at the idea of Mr. King being the next premier, but Mr. Meighen remarked that the Liberal leader had already received several shocks and might receive another on election day.

MEXICAN REBELS LOSE FIGHT, FOUR EXECUTED

Mexicali, Lower California, Nov. 19.—Three Mexican revolutionists were killed yesterday in a battle, and four more executed after a summary court-martial near Algacones, twenty miles west of Mexicali, capital of the northern district of Lower California. It was announced by Gen. Abelardo Rodriguez, commander of federal troops here.

parliament, and going behind the backs of Lord Lee of Fareham, first lord of the admiralty, and Admiral Earl Beatty. The newspaper believes that if Admiral Beatty had been in England he would have resigned rather than agree to the suspension. It also contends that the admiralty's step is not in accordance with the proceedings at the Washington conference, and that there is no real relation between them.

All the newspapers refer at length to the question of unemployment caused by the order.

Submarines Will Be Carefully Considered

Washington, D. C., Nov. 19.—Submarines are certain to figure largely in deliberations of naval experts of the "big five" group now in progress. That is one feature of the Hughes proposal for reduction and limitation of naval strength which the British have indicated a desire to discuss.

It is regarded as virtually certain, however, that the experts will find themselves in agreement that submarines have a very definite place in naval warfare, a legitimate, recognized place.

Investigation does not disclose that there is a difference of view between United States and British naval officers as to the important influence of submarines on operations under-water craft exercise. It is the use made by Germany of her submarines that is to be repudiated by civilized thought not the weapon itself, the experts assert.

It had been argued here that German employment of their U-boats did not realize the full possibilities of these craft. The overwhelming desire of the German admiralty to conserve the strength of this one naval weapon that could challenge British control of the seas, led to a policy of avoiding battle except where all odds were in their favor. The result was a bolder employment of the U-boats might have brought different results.

Although declining to comment on the Hughes' proposal, the British representatives pointed out that the ratio was a natural result of applying the principle that the present strength of the navies should be preserved in any reduction agreement.

It was asserted with the greatest emphasis that the United States delegates determinedly behind the Hughes' proposition and believed that the public opinion of the world would vindicate their view that competitive vindicate must give way to an agreement for reduction, based on existing strength.

The United States, it was asserted, had not "allotted or assigned any ratio of strength to any nation, but simply had let the figure as to present strength automatically become a ratio under the principle pronounced by Secretary of State Hughes in his opening speech to the opening conference that regard must be had for the present naval power of the nations.

Would Open Door Wide.

For any nation to ask now for a change in the ratio or to plead that its national needs require a greater comparative strength than it now possesses would deface the principle entirely, in the view of the United States delegates, and would open the door wide for other powers to make like requests.

It was also reiterated that the United States government felt certain that the strength of navies as set forth in the Hughes' plan was decidedly superior for any definite purpose. In the case of Japan,
