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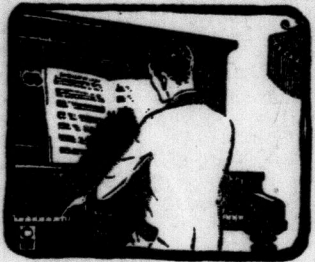

OLD BOYS' WEEK SPORT PROGRAM

Large Number Present at Enthusiastic Gathering of Workers.

BOY SCOUTS TO AID

The London Old Boys' Association held a general meeting last night in the city hall council chambers at which a large turnout of enthusiastic workers discussed the program as submitted by the special committee which convened to arrange a suitable list of entertainments for Old Boys' Week.

The program was accepted as read with the addition of three features. The first of these was a rider pertaining to the carnival contests which stipulates that only two prizes can be awarded for the same costume in all the competitions.

The second was a suggestion that the offer of the Boy Scouts to act as guides be accepted, and that the Scouts and Girl Guides be asked to put on a drinking water service along the route of the monster street parade.

The third suggestion adopted was one offered to place notices and Boy Scouts at both railway stations as information sources to incoming Old Boys.

A motion that the association reconsider their decision to do away with the boxing bout was put to a vote and the motion was lost.

Think Unpopular. The opinion of the meeting was that the association should not foster a move which was evidently unpopular throughout the city, but that if others cared to interest themselves in the promotion of a boxing tournament they were at liberty to do so, and trust to their gate receipts for the financing of the project.

Following the discussion of the general program, the meeting adjourned, and the sports committee met to make the final arrangements for the sport section of the program.

The first Saturday of the Old Boys' Reunion will be the day chosen for the running off of the championship events under the amateur athletic union rules, all results to be official.

Sport Program. The sports program is as follows: Saturday, August 4, Queen's Park. 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, 440-yard dash, 880-yard dash, 1-mile run, 5-mile run, 2-mile run, 2-mile walk, running high jump, pole vault, running broad jump, running hop-step-and-jump, throwing 16-lb. hammer, throwing 56-lb. weight for distance, putting 16-lb. shot, throwing the discus, throwing the javelin, 120-yard hurdle race, 10 hurdles, each 3 feet 6 inches high.

Ladies' events, 100-yard dash; boys' events, 16 years and under. Half-mile city playground relay race, 4 boys to a team; 100-yard dash, one boy from each playground.

Special events—Half-mile relay race, 4 high school boys to a team;

open one-mile relay race, 4 men to a team.

Old Boys' Races.

Monday's sport program is designed to give the visiting old boys a chance to put up the best that is in them in a series of races and events, which for the most part are open to old boys only. These races will be run off at Queen's Park before the drill contest takes place after lunch. They are as follows:

100-yard dash. 50-yard dash for women. Catching the greasy pig, prize to be the pig, wear overalls. 12-lb. shot put. 50-yard fat man's race, all entrants weighing in over 200 pounds. Backward race.

Open tug-of-war, best two pulls out of three, five men to a team, totalling 500 pounds. Chicken catching competition, women only, prize to be the chicken. Tuesday's sport program, Springfield diamond, 2 p.m.:

Baseball, Uncle Sam vs. John Bull. Boys and girls' races, under 6 years, prizes for all entrants. Boys under 10 years, prizes for all. 2:30 p.m. girls' softball teams, Visitors vs. Home Team. Balloon race for girls, two prizes.

Races on Wednesday. Motorcycle races at Queen's Park. Motorcycle and side car races. Polo on motorcycles.

Thursday's program of sport—The London and Port Stanley Railway Commission will put on an aquatic program, boat and swimming races, and a daylight fireworks display. Other events not yet decided upon will be added to make the day at Port a memorable one.

Friday's sport program—Queen's Park—horse races (in harness): 2:12 p.m., \$400 purse; 2:35 p.m., \$400 purse; 2:50 p.m., \$400 purse.

The sports program is not to be announced at present, but will be held more or less as a surprise until the week preceding the reunion.

Constable Denies Rumor of Murder. Declares Indian Met Death At Brantford By Being Run Over.

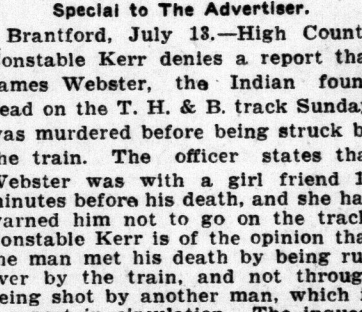
Special to The Advertiser. Brantford, July 13.—High County Constable Kerr denies a report that James Webster, the Indian found dead on the T. H. & B. track Sunday, was murdered before being struck by the train. The officer states that Webster was with a girl friend, 10 minutes before his death, and she had warned him not to go on the track.

Constable Kerr is of the opinion that the man met his death by being run over by the train, and not through being shot by another man, which is a report in circulation. The inquest is being held at the police station at 8 p.m. Monday.

TORONTO CHILD DROWNED FALLS OFF RAFT INTO PIT

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, July 13.—Edward Ruck, aged 12, of New Toronto, was drowned this evening when he fell from a raft into an old shale pit containing about 30 feet of water, behind Booth's brick works, New Toronto.

The boy, his younger brother and other lads were playing on the raft, which was tied to the bank of the pit, when the end of the raft suddenly tilted and the boy was thrown into the water.

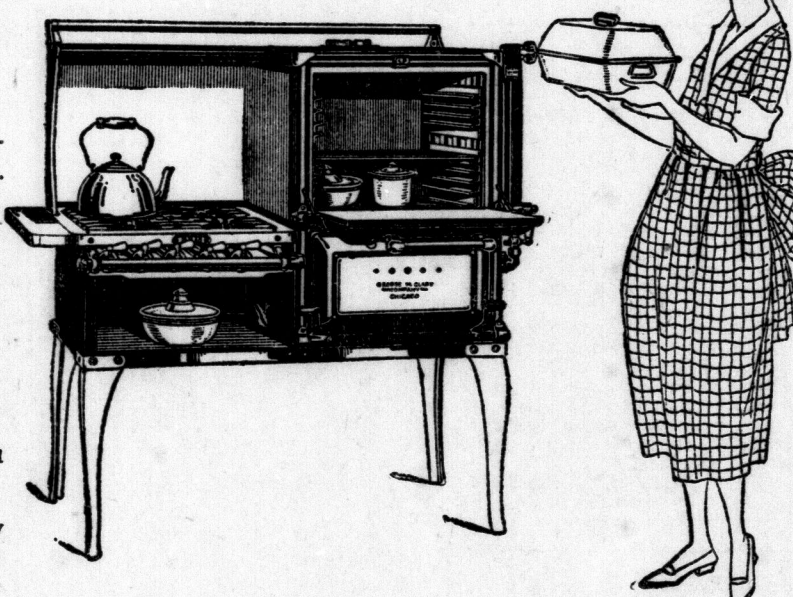
