Deceptive Statements of Fact Not Permissible by Customs.

Now that we have the magisterial yord for it that the sale of articles which are not manufactured in the places which their trade names suggest constitutes a grave infringement of the law, the position becomes remarkably interesting for the vendors of several hundred other items of merchandise. Feeling that in the sale of the

candelabrum in question no attempt was made to offer the article for anything else than what it really was, the directors of Harrod's are naturally dissatisfied with the verdict. Mr. Richard Burbidge, the general manager of the great Brompton Road establishment, said as much to a Daily Mail repre-

sentative yesterday. 'We consider the verdict unfair." said Mr. Burbidge, "and I am almost certain that we shall exercise the right of appeal. If you look at this candelabrum (it is an almost exact fac-simile of the one we sold) you will find that it bears no mark whatever. We certainly sold the article as Dresden, because that is the word applied throughout the world to china that is treated in the Dresden style. As a matter of fact, that candelabrum was made somewhere in Germany, and was afterward treated ornamentally in Dresden. Now, if we had sold the article as Royal Meissen, we should have been guilty of a serious misrepresentation, but, as a matter of fact, we sold it for wlx it was, and for what it will always be known as throughout the trade—Dresden china. Such an ornament as that would cost 15s 6d, but had been Royal Meissen, £5 would scarcely have bought it, so there cannot possibly be any misunderstanding as to the quality of the goods. Dresden is applied to all china that is treated in the style which originally made the Dresden product famous.

"I am afraid that Mr. Shiel's ruling will have some astounding results if it is to be applied to every article of trade that is coupled with the name of the place from which its mere name would suggest that it hails. What, for instance, shall be done to those who sell as "Brussels" a carpet made in Kidderminster and Axminster, as most Brussels carpets are perfectly well known to be?

"Let me direct your attention to the

Weekly Reviews of the Business Sit uation in the United States and Canada.

BRADSTREET'S REPORT.

New York, March 4.-Nearly all signs point to an unprecedented volume of business being done or arranging for at the present time. The aggressive strength of prices, record-breaking bank clearings and continued large exports, particularly of the lower priced cereals, a very heavy volume of business in iron and steel and kindred lines, and generally satisfactory reports as to the volume of spring trade at leading distributive centres, are among the visible features of this trade development. Nearly all of the country cereal products are higher in prices this week, as are also some varieties of provisions, Bessemer pig iron, copper, raw cotton and tin. The further advance in pig iron this week would seem to indicate that the immense current production is as yet without visible effect on values. Few decreases in price are noted, sugar being the most important, while the list of staples steady and unchanged numbers conditions are reported ruling at Boston. Cotton goods display strength, although print cloths of regular widths are somewhat easier. Ginghams are years past. Spring business in woollen goods has been rather disappointing, but a good demand for men's wear goods for fall delivery is reported, and the mills are well supplied with orders. Woollen manufacturers are not in the market for raw wool to any extent, but prices are still firm. Complaint of small profits in woollen goods manufacturing at present prices for the raw product are common. Business failures in the United States for the

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
