

Now Up To The Emperor

Great Zemstvos Gathering in Russia Concludes Its Labors.

A Memorial Urging Reforms to Be Handed to the Czar at Once.

Much Speculation in Political Circles as to Reception It Will Get.

St. Petersburg, Nov. 22.—The work of the Zemstvos being accomplished and the only question remaining relating to aid of the wounded and distressed, many of the members are ready to leave for their homes. At the last moment the former memorial was altered to make it an expression of the hope that it is the wish of the Emperor to summon a national assembly.

The practical result of the meeting is now of all absorbing interest. The memorial will be presented to the Emperor by the Emperor's representative.
