The recent casualty lists have been very heavy and an unusually large number of our young men have had a place therein.
Private Gordon McNair of Nash's Creek, was killed. His mother, Mrs. N. McNair receiving a telegram to that effect. Private McNair was quite young when he enlisted in the 132nd. He was too young to enter the ranks and was taken as bugler. Besides his mother, two sisters, Marie E. at present teaching in the West, and Ida at home, as well as four brothers survive. The brothers are John, Sandy, Vance and Percy, Vance gone with the 58th Battery from Fredericton.

Another Nash's Creek boy who was killed in action at the same time was Private Walter Furlong, son of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Furlong. Pte. Furlong enlisted in the 104th and has been on active service for eighteen months. A brother of the deceased is also on active service having went over in the 132nd. Pte. James Furlong was wounded last spring and is still in hospital, but improving steadily. The late Private Furlong leaves besides his father and mother a large number of sisters and brothers to mourn his loss.

The name of Robert Kenny of Culligan as having died was also in the lists. Private Kenny also sailed with the 132nd and was a very popular and well-liked young man. He is survived by his father residing in Culligan.

Private Gordon Archibald was also killed in action his name having appeared some time ago. Private Archibald was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Alex. Archibald of Archibald, Sett. and was about 20 years of age. He enlisted in the 104th and, so has been in service for about eighteen months. Several brothers and sisters also survive.
