HUGUES HANGED.

Having Killed His Wife He is Killed St. John, N.B., May 9.-Hughes slept soundly last night and rose at 6 o'clock refreshed after his slumber. He ate a hearty breakfast. Soon afterwards Rev. A. S. Newnham and Rev. W. A. Helbrook, churc's of England clergymen, arrived, and engaged with the doomed man in prayer. Hughes listened to the reading of the death sentence without emotion, and announced himself ready. He walked calmly to the scaffold erected in the jail yard, dis-

Hughes made no statement to-day, having on previous occasions acknowledged that he was guilty and that he deserved punishment. The crime for which Hughes has paid the death penalty was the murder of his wife on the 13th of February last. Hughes was a colored man.
