A Gay Crewd at Berlin.

Berlin, March 21.—Emperor William's birthday festivities virtually began yesterday, many societies and clubs throughout Germany holding reunions in honor of the occasion. The influx of strangers into Berlin continued to-day. The concourse in front of the Emperor's palace was even greater than that of yesterday, and there was a similar enthusiastic demonstration, the crowd chanting the hymn "Heil dir Sieger Kranz." The day was observed as a general holiday, and the streets were thronged with people watching the completion of the decoration. All the thoroughfares are gorgeous with flags and floral designs. The weather is clear and bold. There was a constant stream of equipages along Linden-avenue of royalties exchanging visits or going to the palace. The Prince of Wales, Archduke Radolph and the Grand Duke Vladimir were especially ovated. Among the latest arrivals are the King and Queen of Saxony and Prince Louis of Bavaria. The Emperor in the afternoon gave a special audience to foreign envoys, headed by Mgr. Gallimberti. Count Herbert Bismarck officiated at the reception. This was the only official reception of the day. Afterward there was a state dinner to the royalties.

The students at a reunion this afternoon made final arrangements for a torchlight procession to-night and for the reception of delegates from the German universities. It is reported that many pardons will be announced to-morrow and civil and military honors conferred.

Austria's Peaceful Hopes Fortified. PESTH, March 21.—Herr Tisza, Hungarian Premier, in a speech delivered in the lower house of the Hungarian Diet to-day, said that since the Austro-Hungarian extra military credits had been voted, the peaceful hopes ensredits had been voted, the peaceful hopes entertained by the Government had been fortified. The Government, he contended, could only maintain peace if the monarchy was in a position to throw its weight into the scale with decisive effect, and if necessary make an energetic defence of the country's vital interests against other powers which, although equally desirous of peace, kept themselves prepared for war. The sacrifices made for the army, Herr Tisza declared, had been well employed, for the military strength of the monarchy was now as efficient as that of any other power.

The smallest estimate of the number of cottages destroyed is fifty. At 3 o'clock the Athenæum Hotel, at Mayville, was saved, and the fire was under control.

The burned district includes the entire length of Summerfield and Simpson avenues, extending from the old auditorium to the hotel grounds. Simpson-avenue was the most fashionable thoroughtare of the grounds. The total loss will exceed \$100,000, and this will fall almost entirely upon private individuals living in all parts of the country. The Assembly Association's loss will be small.
