Fetal Accident at Grand's Stables.

The elevator was level with the second storay when an employer named George Urquhart, and two small boys, entered it for the purpose of descending. Standing on a beam stretching across the shaft at the first storey was Charles Vizara, one of the stablemen. Urquhart started the elevator at a too rapid pace, and one of the ropes broke. One of the boys jumped to the floor of the second storay when he became alarmed by the speedy descent, and escaped without injury. Urquhars and the other boy received a few bruises, and were badly shaken up. Vizara's remains were taken to the hospital. The victim of the accident had been engaged at Graud's last week only, and came to this city from St. Catharines. He was a widower, 44 years of age, and leaves a son behind him.
