TRADE TOPICS

Mr. J. P. Spink, who has returned from Montreal, where he has been engaged with others in fixing the four standards, states that straight roller will be pretty much the same as last season, with the exception that it will be hardly as white in color. "Flour is very dull," said Mr. S., "and the requirements of Quebec will be small for some time to come."

"The bulls got all they wanted to-day," said an operator in Chicago wheat yesterday. "The decline to-day wipes out the advance of several days; it goes down much quicker than it goes up, in spite of the low prices."

Farmers are holding their barley in anticipation of higher prices next season, when the United States duty will be lowered. There is very little coming in at receiving points, and prices in consequence are higher.

"A great deal of unnecessary comment has been made concerning the poor business of loan companies the past year," said a manager the other day. "Nothing is said about insurance companies, which I venture to say, are as much if not more interested in Toronto property than the loan companies."

"It is a significant fact that, notwithstanding Gardner's guns have been primed against Canadian cattle all the season," says a British correspondent of The Trade Bulletin, "the decrease in import from the Dominion amounts to but 14,000 head. Seeing that previously the trade, to the north at any rate, was mainly in store beasts, these figures show that Canada has really increased her export under adverse circumstances, and that a great business is in sight for Northwest ranchers in the future in completed cattle. We must have beef from somewhere, and these beasts have been much admired in the sale ring. It must be the business of cattle raisers in Canada to finish for our market, so as to be independent of the store trade. Does not the experience of this season show that the cattle trade of Canada need not cease with the winter's arrival? Would it not pay—as the States and Canada have been placed by the Government on the same footing—to ship during the intervals before navigation opens, via the States? Prices are going to be fair at least, if not higher, as they look to be."

Volunteer Monument Committee. A meeting of the "Volunteer Monument Committee" was held at Government House on Thursday, Dec. 7, at 4 p.m. Among those present were: His Honor the Lieut. Governor, Sir Casimir Gzowski, Mr. McLean-Howard, Mrs. Moss, Mrs. John Fletcher, Miss Fletcher, Colonel Grassett, Colonel Dawson, Colonel Hamilton.

On motion Colonel Grassett took the chair and Colonel Dawson acted as secretary. Mrs. Fletcher, the secretary of the Ladies' Committee, read the minutes of former meetings, also a list of those who subscribed to the fund. The amount collected up to date and now in hand is \$1942. It was suggested by Sir Casimir Gzowski that there should be some limit to the time for closing the subscription list, and whatever amount was then in hand should be expended on the monument. The meeting decided to close the list on Oct. 1, 1894, and that every effort should be made before that time to raise the necessary funds.

Several designs for the monument were submitted, the cost varying from \$3000 to \$5000. It was decided that the Ladies' Committee should have power to add to their number.

EXTRADITION WITH ARGENTINE.

James Spencer Balfour, the Swindler, Will be Taken Back to England. LONDON, Dec. 8.—An extradition treaty has been entered into between the Argentine and British Governments. By the terms of this treaty James Spencer Balfour, whose swindling operations in building societies ruined an enormous number of people and who fled to the Argentine Republic to escape arrest and prosecution, will be immediately arrested and turned over to the British authorities.

University Notes. The final meeting of the Modern Language Club for the term will be held at University College on Monday next, Dec. 20, and will be resumed again on January 4, 1894.

The class of '96 have drawn out a class society constitution as long as the provincial moral law. It stands on the bulletin board as a monument of the energy of youth.

For several years, in fact since the fire which destroyed the University building in Feb. 1890, Toronto University has never held a conversation. Regularly every year the proposition to do so has come up and as regularly have the powers that be frowned upon it. The Osgoode authorities have also taken fright. It is said, and the students are looking for a place of habitation for their coming conversations. The authorities of Victoria University, however, have no fears on the subject and have decided to throw open their doors to the students and their friends on the evening of Dec. 15. Their annual conversation promises to be a very inviting affair.

There will be a mass meeting of the students at Association Hall on Sunday afternoon to hear Chancellor Barwash, Principal Sheraton and Hon. S. H. Blake, who will speak under the auspices of the Canadian College Mission Society. It is expected that the College Club will be in attendance.


