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London Collegiate Drops Two Events to St. Thomas

Rugby Game Results in Complete
Downfall of Locals by 61 to 1,
the L.C.I. Registering Only
Victory in Baseball by 22 to
6 and Another Loss in Basket
Ball by 11 to 2

Yesterday afternoon the St. Thomas Collegiate students won two out of three events at the annual invitational sports day here from the London Collegiate, taking the girls' basketball game by 11 to 2 and the rugby match by 61 to 1. The baseball game between the girls' teams was a close contest, with the London team winning by 22 to 6.

The usual parade, headed by the 17th Regiment Band and McDonald's Pipe and Drum, preceded the games at Deane's Park, and the Union Jack for the best appearance in the parade was won by the London team.

The football game proved a rout. The St. Thomas team completely outclassed the locals, with possession of the ball practically all the time. The Saints towered over the locals in yards, and the manner in which they carried out their plays left only the number of points scored in doubt.

The London Collegiate twelve was to some extent handicapped with Reg. Beard, their star, limping about in the game with a "charley horse," but it is doubtful whether he would have taken at least 12 yards to stop the barbecue.

NEED ADDING MACHINE.

The score by quarters was: 6 to 1, 17 to 26 to 12 and 12 to 0. London registered the first point on a punt to Turpin, when Hunter, downed him for a rouge, and after that it was just a procession, though St. Thomas managed to score only one try, and then a convert in the first period. The game proved to be the beginning of many such misplays.

Early in the second quarter St. Thomas lost the ball when near the London line, Hill dribbling out of their reach, but the Saints recovered it near mid-field. Gains for yards repeatedly enabled John to score another try. Ardiel fumbled a kick and the Saints gained possession, with the Saints carrying the ball over for the third try and John converted, making the count 17 to 1. John noticed another touchdown and converted it for 23 just before the period ended.

The third period proved to be the most lively with five more tries and several conversions. Scott, Turner, and Kilmer figuring in most of the play.

By this time the throng that had gathered to witness the redemption of London Collegiate's football career had been considerably thinned out and only the faithful stayed for the finishing touch.

The local reserves were depleted, as injuries meant the removal of the regulars. Wesley, Kilmer, and Scott, who for the first time, suffered most with an injured spine, being carried off the field and then taken to the Y. M. C. A. Turpin, a sore-topped half-back on the St. Thomas back field, raced for an extra try in the last period as dusk was falling fast. John booted it for another try, making 33 to 0. A long punt from John to Crittle gave St. Thomas another touchdown, when a big wing hustled another try, the ball when Crittle fumbled. This, too, was converted for the last point.

BETTER TEAM WITH PRIZES. The period ended before further damage was done, but it proved sufficient to completely humble the locals, with the perseverance, will to win, and the St. Thomas crown, as most of their stalwarts were sent to the hospital, and other vocation besides attend Collegiate, since a majority have reached the full-grown stage of hood.

Herrmann Sees Ruth Suspended For 1922 Season

Former Chairman of Commission
Is Positive "Home Run King"
Will Start With Rest

CINCINNATI, O., Oct. 25.—That Babe Ruth will be suspended for all next season for his violation of organized baseball rules concerning a world's series player engaging in a barnstorming tour, was the opinion expressed by August Herrmann, president of the National Baseball Commission.

"I am positive that Commissioner Landis will not condone Ruth's action to any great extent," said Herrmann. "I am sure the player will be suspended and possibly for all of next season. It is certain in my mind that he will not start the season with the Yankees, at any rate."

O. B. MAKES BIG PAY.

"Many fans are inclined to support a ball player in any action he may take as against the officials and managers," Herrmann went on to say. "I think it is no more than fair to call attention to the fact that if it were not for organized ball as conducted to-day no player could begin to earn the large salaries now paid the stars."

"I understand that Ruth received a salary of \$20,000 a year. Such a figure would be utterly impossible without the organization under which baseball is operated."

"Ruth has given an excuse for his action that he fulfilled his contract with the Yankees and was under no further obligation to his team until next season."

It is true that his contract expired October 2, if he cared to go on a barnstorming tour at that time instead of taking part in the world series he would have been quite within his right. But he signed the agreement that he would not play in an exhibition game after the world's series and he has not only defied Commissioner Landis, his own club owners and managers, but has also violated his own signed agreement.
