

EDUCATION FOR WOMEN VOTERS

Local Council Discusses Function of Citizenship Committee

MAY BRING OUT SLATE

Educational Meetings Proposed When New Convener Named

That the citizenship committee of the Local Council of Women is an educational factor among the women of the city and, as such should continue to function, was the decision reached yesterday afternoon by the L. C. of W. executive meeting at Lennox with the president, Mrs. E. B. Smith, in the chair.

The meeting resolved itself into an interesting and enthusiastic discussion of the aims and accomplishments of the citizenship committee, which, organized in the spring of 1921, came into full action with the civic and federal elections of last autumn.

Designed primarily to educate women to an intelligent use of the franchise, and as an organized factor for the well-being of the community, the citizenship committee must continue to be largely educational, in the opinion of the L. C. of W. executive.

Mrs. David Williams was strongly of the opinion that the real power of the committee lay in the training of women citizens to a knowledge of the affairs of the day, rather than in the bringing out of candidates for civic office.

General feeling was, however, in favor of a Local Council slate for the municipal elections.

"We wield a power," an officer remarked, "and, as women voters, it is a duty and a privilege to do our best to have civic authority placed in the right hands."

"Not necessarily women, but women or men who best fill the office," was given as the objective of the organization.

The resignation of Mrs. J. R. Henderson, the efficient convener of the committee for the past year, was accepted with much regret. Mrs. John Rose, Mrs. Donald McLean and Mrs. John Gemmill, with Mrs. E. B. Smith executive, were named a committee to arrange for a successor to Mrs. Henderson.

The question of the organized support of a new Y. W. C. A. building project by the affiliated women's societies of the city was considered, but left in abeyance for the present.

It was suggested that the appointment of a convener for the citizenship committee might be immediately followed by educational meetings arranged by the committee among the women of the city for the purpose of studying and discussing the civic situation.

E.L. McARTHUR DIES SUDDENLY

LEAVES HOST OF FRIENDS

Widely Known in Canadian Newspaper Field

News of the sudden passing away of E. L. McArthur at Montreal yesterday brought sincere grief to his many friends in London and Western Ontario. Mr. McArthur dropped dead in a broker's office.

For some years he had successfully maintained a special newspaper advertising agency office, representing for Montreal and Quebec all of the important daily papers of Western Canada and many leading Eastern publications, including The London Free Press. His journalistic experience covered the most important departments of daily and weekly publications and no one ever achieved more distinct successes.

He had the brain of a man and the heart of a child. Keen, able, aggressive and courageous, he was at the same time a never-failing fount of sympathy and interest.

Mr. McArthur's death leaves a blank space in the Canadian newspaper field and ends a friendship that was always worth while.

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ARRESTED FOR WINDSOR POLICE

Percy King Wanted in Connection With Death of Mrs. Ford

CAUGHT BY DETROIT POLICE

Said to Be Person Who Provided the Drugs

DETROIT, Sept. 29.—The Detroit police are holding for the Windsor authorities Percy King, aged 24, whom they believe was the provider of the narcotic drugs that caused the death, on September 13, of Mrs. Gladys Todd, aged 24, of Windsor. King, who gives his occupation as a waiter, was arrested last night on Woodward avenue. He is said to be known also as Ben. Garrett. The man being sought in the case was known as "Ben."

The mysterious "Ben" was the last person to be seen with Mrs. Todd before her death. At the coroner's inquest the woman's death was determined as being caused by an overdose of drugs. John Todd, her husband, admitted "doper," laughed at the verdict, claiming that his wife had been a heavy user of drugs for some time and that one dose could not have caused her death.


