NEW MODE OF LIGHTING IN FRANCE .- The French papers state that the rumours of a very in- Bank of British North America. teresting and astonishing discovery begin to be circulated in Paris. It consists in furnishing the means of lighting simultaneously, all the different highways which cross France in all directions, by means of simple iron wires connected with electromagnetic machines.
