INDISSOLUBLE FRIENDSHIP

U. S. Commander Lauds the British In Greeting.

NEW YORK, August 4.—Greeting on the sixth anniversary of Great Britain's entry into the war: today were called to Field Marshal Earl Haig and Admiral Sir David Beatty by Franklin D. Olier, National Commander of the American Legion.

"Honor to the statesman who had the courage to assume the responsibility of that decision," read the message.

"Honor to the British millions, who, with valour unsurpassed and hearts of oak, executed that decision on Britain's many fronts. When we contemplate what would have been the state of affairs in the world today

had not Britain acted as she did, and when she did, the trials and difficulties of the present hour, how ever vexatious they may seem now to be, sink into comparative insignificance.

"United States forces have had the privilege of service on land and sea under British high command.

"The memories of the associations of those great days will never perish. They will perpetuate themselves in our hearts and thus serve to perpetuate the indissoluble friendship of the British and American peoples."
