CLARA K WINS A GOOD BACE AND HAS TO LOWER HER RECORD

As usual, thanks to the dilatoriness of the judge, there was a postponed race to finish at the start off on this day. It was the 2.23 pace with half a dozen in the field. On the preceding day Glenara (2.24½) and Dolce (2.23½) each got a heat in, Dixie Van (2.24½) being second in the second heat and Dolce in the first. Billy Richbell, a chestnutgelding by King Mac, from Howard, N.Y., was the favorite in the pools, but he proved himself a terribly bad actor and after finishing last twice he won twice, then went back to fifth and wound up by being distanced. Like the famous Ryland T., Billy proved himself a very bad article to gamble on. Dolce again came to the front in the fifth heat paced on the fourth day after scoring two seconds, Glenara having two lasts. In the sixth heat Dolce captured the lion's share of the money, Glenara being second and Richball, the only other starter, distanced, as previously described. Dixie Van, Maud L. and Nettie Y. were all ruled out. On account of the distancing of Richball no third money was given but Dixie Van got fourth.

CLARA K. LOWERS HER RECORD.

After performing indifferently in New York State, Clara K. (2.19‡) made her reappearance in Cauada in the 2.18 trot and won right down cleverly and be showing a magnificent burst of speed i the third heat, by which she clipped 42 seconds off her previous record. The time first hung out was 2.191, but Mr. Hammill announced from the stand that a mistake had been made and that the heat had been trotted in 2.17½. Many were disposed to doubt the righteousness of the proceeding, but it was allowed to go without appeal. Forest Boy captured go without appeal. Forest Boy captured the first heat very prettij from the field of seven, with Bolly C. (2.19) second, El-frida (2.18]) third, Lady Watson, who at one time looked formidable, but fell off badly, fourth, Yrowsky (2.18]), by Red Wilkes, from Cope Stinson's stable, fifth, Clara K., sixth, Blackstone (2.214) eventh, and Tuscarora (2.22½) last. E frida was much fancied, but she acted very rankly and, after finishing fifth in the second heat and third in the third, was withdrawn. Dolly C. took the second heat rather prettily and then Clara K. came round her at the distance, won the third in the last time referred to, following with the fourth and fifth heats and consequently won the race very handily. Vrowsky beat Dolly C. out in the last two heats, but only took fourth money. Tuscarors was drawn after the fourth heat. Forest Boy was evidently sore from his efforts on the previous day, and persisted in breaking so badly in rounding the Club House turn that he was not in it after the first heat.

BABETTE, THE FAVORITE, SCORES. Eleven scored for the 2.26 trot and pace. Babette, a bay mare by Sir John

from Stoney Creek, with a recognized trotting record of 2.251 and an unrecog nized one of 2.221, was made the favorite at \$10 to \$9 for the field. After the uncertain Billy Richball had taken the first heat in 2.201, with Baby Girl (2.261), a pacer by Ringwood, second, and herself third, Babette came out and won the third, Babette came out and won the second heat quite easily in 2.22½, Billy Richball playing his old tricks, in which he was joined by Baby Girl, and Daisy S. following the winner under the wire. Babette's driver did not propose to risk the race by going another such a heat as the third, so he let Keswick take the pole immediately after the word was given and keep the lead all the way around, he winning in 2.21 with Sailor Wilkes from Buffalo second, Babette third and Daisy S. fourth. But in the fifth heat the Stoney Creek mare was once more on hand. THE GRAND CIRCUIT AT ROCHESTER.

ROCHESTER, August 13th .- The Grand Circuit horses found a fast track awaiting them here to-day when the fifth meeting of the series began. They took full advantage of the splendid footing, and made the best time that has been seen in any of the slow trotting classes this year. Coupled with this was the defeat of the hitherto unbeaten Alar, who has swept everything before her since she van-quished Ballona at Detroit last month. These sensations were furnished in the 2.23 trot for a purse of \$5,000, and race went to the chestnut stallion Carldon from Pittsfield, Mass. That his victory was a complete surprise may be ju from the fact that he sold in the field for \$3 in pools of \$73, and was not a favorite \$3 in pools of \$7.5, and was not a ravortill he had won two heats. Alar was in great demand at \$30, and Rex Americus sold out at \$20 in these pools. The Newburgh trainer, W. C. Trimble of Cobwebs fame, was behind Alar, Goldsmith having nore important engagements at Terre-Haute. in the first heat, and after taking it com-fortably to the third quarter, brushed home with Rex Americus at a 2.06 clip, disposing of the Buffalo crack without any trouble in 2.14. Alar had made one of her plunging breaks, and finished well back. She kept steady the next time, but neither the favorite nor the second choice could do anything with Carldon, and as before he flew home in 31½ seconds, capturing the second heat in 2.12½. Even then he had so much left that it was evident Alar and Rex Americus were con siderably overmatched. The latter did better in the third heat, trotting the best mile of his life, but still playing se fiddle to the older stallion. Carldon set a faster pace for the first three quarters of this heat, reaching there in 1.382, and then with the same lightning stroke as before, flew home in 2.101. Rex Americus labored in second place, and the im petuous Alar made another fatal mistake in the effort to retrieve her lost laurels.

Carldon's previous record was 2.222, made during the New England Breeders meeting in Boston as a four year-old. He is owned jointly by F. M. Dodge, who trains him, and the veteran auction pool seller, J. W. Quimby.

Dodge was a prominent factor in the race for 2.15 pacers, landing H. J. Rockwell in front in the first heat in 2.13]. Then Geers uncovered another fast and game sidewheeler in Kitty B., that outfooted Rockwell the next in 2.113, and T. H. Moore's, Ottawa, b.m., Clara S. Hurton, Chara S. Hu
