Difficulty in getting ; bees below Honey-Boards.

Ourry No. 238.—I used queen ex cluding honey-boards on the Langstroth hive last season, and doubted whether the three openings of about 12 x 12 inch were sufficient to allow the bees to pass to the upper frames for extracting, and I came to the conclusion that they were sufficient last season; from some (to me) unexpi .ned cause, in several hives the bees wert up but had great difficulty in getting them down again at the end of the season and large quantities died on Will some of those the hourds. versed in taking honey with the queenexcluding honey-board please say how they get over this difficulty?
